

Official Minutes Board of Trustees.

New Iberia, Aug. 2nd, 1915.
The Board of Trustees of the City of New Iberia convened this day with Mayor H. S. Sealy presiding, Messrs. Suberbielle and Villermin present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved by motion of Mr. Villermin, seconded by Mr. Suberbielle.

A final vote being taken on Certificate No. 78, resulting as follows: Mr. Sealy, Suberbielle and Villermin; Nay, none. Said finance being for Corinne and Hopkins Streets.

In compliance with the request of Messrs. DeJersey & Naff, the Attorney was instructed to bring suit against the following persons, for the non-payment of sidewalks claims, unless same are paid at once: Jos. Cotilono, Evangelina Pecarorro, Alfred Rivier, William Walsh, A. R. L. School Board, Jules Langlais, John Winters, Jr., Alfred Romero, Adeole Romero, William Ssalle.

Mr. Valere Babineaux was given the position of coal passer at the Water & Light Plant to replace Mr. Walter French, dismissed, salary \$40.00 per month. A request for one street light, corner Corinne near Robertson, cost of installation being \$20.00, was ordered installed on motion of Mr. Villermin, seconded by Mr. Sealy and carried unanimously.

Mr. Louis Walet and Mr. Vert appeared before the Board with a request that the City pay for the cement sidewalks put down in front of the school properties, on motion of Mr. Sealy, seconded by Mr. Suberbielle, action on this matter was deferred to next Monday's regular meeting.

On motion of Mr. Sealy, seconded by Mr. Villermin and adopted unanimously, the pasture and stable belonging to the Iberia Cattle Co., was rented for a couple of months to keep the City stock at a cost of Fifty Cents per month per head.

Mr. Sealy recommended the purchase of a mowing machine, on motion of Mr. Suberbielle, seconded by Mr. Villermin and adopted unanimously, the Trustee of Finance was authorized to purchase a mowing machine for use on streets.

The following petition was received:

State of Louisiana, Parish of Iberia, be it known that we the undersigned residents of the City of New Iberia, La., do declare that we live on either sides of a certain lane which runs from the east bank of Bayou Teche to the street up to a street, but that said lane though open and forming the separating lines of the property, situated on each side thereof, belonging to us, has never been legally dedicated to public use, that appreciating the absolute necessity of keeping said lane open for the use of our respective properties, through alone we can reach our said premises, we have these presents agreed to and

we do hereby grant dedicate unto the City of New Iberia, a strip of land abutting on said lane all along the front of our respective properties, of a width on each side of said lane to make a high-way eighteen feet wide all of its length, and do hereby grant, sell, transfer unto said City of New Iberia said strip of land for and in consideration of the price and sum of One Dollar each, which we acknowledge having received in current money of the United States of America, and for the further consideration of the benefit and advantage which will accrue to us by enhancing the value of our said respective properties, as it is the only way whereby we can reach our said homes. We have attached to this act a diagram of the lane showing its course and the sides whereon our said properties are situated.

We have signed this Act before the hereinafter signed witnesses on this 20th day of December, 1914. Mrs. John Emmer having already given ten feed wide owes no further donation.

On motion of Mr. Sealy, seconded by Mr. Villermin and adopted by the following Yea and Nay vote: Yea, Mr. Sealy, Suberbielle, Villermin; Nay, none.

The present system of collecting the revenues of the Water & Light Plant after discussion was ordered continued.

On motion of Mr. Villermin, seconded by Mr. Suberbielle, the meeting adjourned.

STRIKES IN AMMUNITION FACTORIES.

Mr. Samuel Gompers is quoted as saying that he is prepared to make good his statement that a German emissary had attempted to bribe labor men to bring about strikes in American ammunition factories. Until evidence of this nature is produced the public will naturally be governed in its view of the probabilities of the matter by the course of events.

There has been an epidemic of strikes add disturbances in all manner of industries connected with the production and shipping of war supplies. Some of these appear to have been quickly settled, but on the other hand the indications are that there are plenty more to come. It may be possible to judge from the circumstances whether they are bona fide labor movements or are the result of alien instigation in the interest of Germany.

"But the matter is so serious to be left that kind of judgment," says the New York Evening Post "Without undertaking to pass on the truth of the assertions of foreign machination or conspiracy, we feel that the question is one that should engage the immediate attention of the Federal authorities. Doubtless agents of the government are already at work quietly probing into the matter.

Whether such an inquiry as the Post suggests will have the effect of quieting suspicion or confirming it, the result in either case would be important. And in the latter event it would become the duty of the government to take steps to protect American manufactures against alien interference with their lawful business.

PRESIDENT OF HAITI IS KILLED.

Port au Prince, Haiti, July 28. —A mob of infuriated Haitians today removed Vilbrun Guillaume, president of Haiti, from the French legation, where he took refuge yesterday, and shot him to death in front of the building.

This act of violence followed the burial of the 160 political prisoners who were massacred in prison yesterday morning at the time of the revolutionary outbreak against President Guillaume.

The mob, composed mostly of relatives of the victims, invaded the French legation and seized Guillaume M. Girard, French minister of Haiti, protested vigorously but he was powerless.

Guillaume was dragged forth. Once in the street, the crowds surged around him with imprecations and he was promptly shot to death, his body mutilated and dragged through the streets.

The people of Port au Prince are in a state of intense excitement and further violence is feared.

The arrival of the American cruiser Washington is expected at any moment. M. Girard was counting on the coming of the cruiser to afford protection of the legation.

CHARTER OF THE CHAIN OIL COMPANY, INC.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Iberia. Be it known that on this 24th day of May A. D. 1915, before me, Alphonse Davis, a Notary Public, in and for the Parish of Iberia, State of Louisiana, duly commissioned and qualified as such in the presence of the undersigned competent witnesses, personally came and appeared, the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed who declare that they desire to avail themselves of Act 267 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana of the year 1914, and the other laws of the State relative to the organization of corporations, that they do by these presents, bind, covenant, and agree and form themselves into a corporation and body politic in law together with all persons who may thereafter become associated with them, and to acquire the rights and powers of a body corporate, they do thereby form themselves into a corporation under the name and style and for the purpose hereinafter set forth.

ARTICLE 1. The name and title of this corporation shall be "The Chain Oil Company Company Inc." and its domicile is hereby established at New Iberia, Iberia Parish, State of Louisiana, and under its corporate name, said corporation shall have the power and authority to contract, sue and to be sued and to make and use a corporate seal, and the same to break and alter at pleasure, and to hold, receive, purchase, mortgage or convey under its corporate name, property both real and personal, for the purpose of carrying out the objects thereof, and to employ and appoint such officers, directors, and other employees as may be permitted by law, and other employees as may be deemed necessary and proper, and to do all other acts and things as may be permitted by law, or may be necessary and proper to carry out the objects and purposes of this corporation.

Said corporation unless sooner dissolved shall exist for a period of thirty years. Service of citation, or other legal process shall be made in conformity with the existing laws governing the corporations in this State.

ARTICLE 2. The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared to be, to engage in the business of drilling upon or otherwise exploring such lands as it may acquire in full or in part ownership, or may lease or so which it may acquire any rights whatever for the purpose of discovering oil, gas or other minerals and the same to explore for commercial purposes; to undertake all works and make all contracts to that end as may be necessary, and to sell or otherwise dispose of such products as they may bring forth and to do all things that may be necessary to facilitate the drilling exploration, and sell and deliver thereof and in fact to do all things necessary and conducive and to the benefit of said corporation.

ARTICLE 3. The Capital Stock shall be Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) divided into Six Hundred (600) shares of the par value of Twenty Five Dollars (\$25.00) each, which stock shall be paid for in cash at the time of its subscription, or in such installments as the Board may direct, stock may be issued in exchange for property or rights actually received or purchased by the corporation, or good will, or other valuable considerations as may be permitted by law, and after due appraisal by the Board of Directors of said corporation.

No Stock Holder shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contract or failure of said corporation, in any further sum than that provided by law, nor shall any mere informality in the organization have the effect of rendering said charter null or expose said stock holders to any liability, other than that specified by law. Fifty per cent of all stock subscribed for must be actually paid in before the corporation engages in business, and the remainder within Twelve months thereafter under the restrictions pointed out by said Act 267 of the year 1914. The amount to which the capital stock may be increased is hereby fixed at the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00).

The Board of Directors shall have the power to fill vacancies in their number, caused by death, resignation or otherwise, from among the stock holders of the corporation and said Board shall have control of the property of this company and shall so conduct, manage and use the same as in their discretion they deem necessary, and which is consistent with the organization and affairs of the company; It may adopt such rules and regulations as the affairs of the corporation may require, employ such laborers, clerks or other agents as may appear desirable, to fix and determine the salary of each officer and other employee, all in accordance with law.

Wooster, Centerville, La.; and F. E. Delahoussaye, St. Martinville, La.

At every election and meeting of the Stock Holders, each stock holder shall be entitled to one vote for each share of stock owned by him; voting by written proxy shall be allowed under the provisions of Section 11 of said Act 267 of the year 1914.

ARTICLE 5. Stockholders meetings for the election of Directors shall be held annually on the first Monday in June, at the domicile of the corporation; notice thereof shall be delivered personally by depositing in the Post Office, to the proper address to each stockholder, announcement thereof at least fifteen days (15) before the meeting. At least two days (2) before said meeting a complete list of the stockholders entitled to vote, shall be open for inspection by the stockholders, at the place of said meeting, all other meetings of stockholders may be conducted in accordance with section 10 of said Acts 267 of the year 1914.

ARTICLE 6. This charter may be changed, or amended, or the corporation dissolved, under the terms and conditions, and in accordance with said Act 267 of the year 1914.

ARTICLE 7. This corporation shall have all the rights and powers granted by corporations under said act 267 of the year 1914 not otherwise specified.

The names and the Post Office addresses of the subscribers in this Corporation and a statement of the number of shares of stock which each agrees to take in this corporation, and a description and value of the property to be given in exchange for the stock, as required by law, is hereto annexed, together with the valuation placed thereon by the Board of Directors of this corporation.
