An important meeting of the Sewerage Board will be held next Tuesday when the State Engineer of the Louisiana Board of Health will be present to go over the maps and profiles of the proposed sewerage district as drawn by Mr. Xavier Kramer. It will be remembered, Mr. Kramer was employed to do this work a few months before the old administration finished their term of office. Within the next thirty or forty days it is more than probable a tax will be submitted to give New Iberia a first-class sewerage system.

—We notice that Mayor Sealy has had at work for the past week a Mowing machine, cutting the weeds in the ditches which have, in some instances, grown to considerable proportions. Mr. Sealy tells us that he expects to cut his labor bills for this kind of work very much since getting the use of this machine. Since assuming charge of that department of this municipality, he is doing everything he can to reduce the expenses of the City, doing away entirely with the Street Commissioner that was used by his predecessor, effecting a big saving in that one instance alone. While he intends to keep up an efficient garbage collecting system he will positively refuse to use his wagons to haul off limbs of trees which is often put out in the road to be hauled off at the City's expense. In this he is correct, this expense should be borne solely by the property holder who wishes to dispose of trimmings from his trees. We notice also that many citizens have their grass cut on their premises and place it in the public road when they should dispose of it by burning and thus save the City employees the annoyance of hauling it off. This would enable the teams to be used in doing grading work which oftentimes have to be neglected because they have no time to devote to the roads. Mr. Sealy is on the right track and if our people work with him, despite the curtailed revenues of the City treasury, the streets can be kept up as they should be at all seasons of the year. His Honor is determined to see that every dollar used in his department bring one hundred cents returns and we can assure him he has the good wishes of all of the property holders within the confines of New Iberia. It behooves our citizens to also comply with the ordinances by keeping the grass cut on their premises and notices are now being issued through the Board of Health's offices to that effect. In discussing with Mr. Sealy the cement sidewalks contract, he stated to us that if any more walks are ever put down during his administration he intended to superintend its construction and save the percentage now being paid the contractors. This is an excellent idea and with Mr. Sealy's knowledge of cement construction, being a contractor himself thousands of dollars will be saved the people in the future.

The idea of both the Sewerage Board and Board of Trustees is to simply extend the present water and electric light tax that will expire in 1917. In that case the property holders will not be out anything more than making connections after the sewerage is completed.

—A matter that concerns those of our farmers who are now engaged in pork raising is that a meeting of organization of the Packing Plant which is to be built at Napoleonville will be held on August 21 at 2 o'clock in the afternoon at that place. We were requested to call the attention of our people to the date of the meeting as they will be highly benefitted from the industry once it is a going concern. The manner in which the people of that section took hold of the Packing Plant proposition shows what can be done when they go after a thing. There is to-day thousands of hogs being raised in our midst and with a good market, hog raising is bound to be profitable.

Parish Superintendent of Education Louis A. Walet has everything in readiness for the re-opening of the public schools of the Parish on September 6th and prospects are bright for one of the largest enrollments in this City for many years back. With the exception of two teachers in the High School, the same faculty, under Mr. Chas. M. Bahon, the principal, will be in their class rooms. It is regrettable that Mr. C. H. Lewis, the teacher in mathematics declined his former position, preferring to devote his time to the study of law at Baton Rouge. The teacher of art has not as yet been filled owing to the determination of the Superintendent to get a combination instructor to fill the place. All of the schools of the Parish will be maintained for the first three months of the session solely upon the special tax that was voted throughout the Parish some months since for this purpose. It is unfortunate that those of Loreauville will not be opened until they are all working under the general fund as outlined by the Parish School Board. It is very probable the tax will be submitted to the property holder of the Fourth Ward at some not far distant date to see whether or not the people of that Ward will reverse their decision.
