

On motion of Mr. Sealy, seconded by Mr. Villerman, the amount for cement sidewalk as published in last week's minutes, was found to have been paid, to account of William Lassalle, same being published by error. Motion to correct.

The following minimum charges were offered by Mr. Villerman, for patrons of the water and light plant, to be effective on water meter rates:

"Where a 5-8 meter is requested the minimum per month shall be \$1.00; 3-4 meter, shall be \$1.50; 1 in. shall be \$2.00; 1 1-4 in. shall be \$3.00; 1 1-3 in. shall be \$5.00; 2 in. shall be \$10.00; 3 in. shall be \$25.00.

Dr. Arthur Goodwin and Mr. Fritz Dietlein appeared before the Board in behalf of the Teche Stock Fair, with a request for a donation of \$250.00 to be used for the benefit of said fair; it was on motion of Mr. Sealy, seconded by Mr. Villerman and adopted unanimously that the amount of \$250.00 be given the Teche Fair Assn to be taken out of the revenues of 1916 and placed in the Budget of the year 1916.

On the opinion of the City Attorney, the request of the School Board for payment of the Cement Sidewalks in front of the school property was refused, the City having no authority to pay same.
