

FIRST DIRIGIBLE ORDERED FOR AMERICAN NAVY.

Definite steps have been taken by the navy in carrying out its aviation program, which was outlined with the army's plans in the February issue of this magazine. Secretary Daniels recently approved a contract for the construction of the first dirigible to be built for the navy. It is expected, will be delivered in September at the Pensacola, Fla., aeronautic station, where it will be used particularly for experimental and training purposes.

The craft will be 175 ft. in length, 55 ft. in height, and of 20,000 cu ft gas capacity. It will be capable of carrying eight men, will have a speed of approximately 25 miles an hour, and when loaded to its capacity, a rate of action of about two hours is however, can be increased by lessening the number of occupants and replacing their weight by gasoline. The contract price of the craft is \$45,636.

The new flying boats of the latest type have been delivered to the navy of late, while three progress machines are to be ready a summer. Bids for three additional craft are to be asked immediately. The armored cruiser "North Carolina," which spent the winter in the Mediterranean, to become the new aviation base, after it has been thoroughly overhauled, and will be stationed at Pensacola.—From the August Popular Mechanics Magazine.

ZEPPELIN LOSES BATTLE WITH MONOPLANE.

Official announcement of the most spectacular exploit so far preformed in Europe's titanic conflict was made June 7 by the secretary of the British admiralty. It concerned the destruction of a Zepselin dirigible in a daring aerial encounter 6,000 ft above Ghent in Belgium. Six bombs were dropped on the hull of the German craft by sub-Lieutenant R. A. J. Warneford, R. N., who attacked the enemy single-handed in a small monoplane.

While complete returns from forty-seven parishes and practically complete returns from the remaining seventeen parish in Louisiana, with the one exception of Cameron, the Constitutional Convention was voted down in Tuesday's general election 30,071 to 37,017. Orleans parish, upon which the friends of the convention depended to carry the proposition to victory, gave the convention a majority of 18,500 votes, but a smaller vote was polled in New Orleans than had been expected, and with the heavy majorities piled up against the vote was three to one against the convention, the opposition carried the day.


