Proceedings of the Police Jury.

New Iberia, Sept. 2d, 1915.
The Police Jury of Iberia Parish met this day in regular session. Dr. J. Wofford Sanders presiding and the following members present, viz: Dr. P. A. Boykin, Mrs. Laodice Deleambre, E. J. H. P. Gates, R. A. Jacob, J. Landry, O. D. Romero, P. C. Walet. Absent, Messrs. Decourt and F. J. Druilhet. The minutes of the last meeting read and approved.
The reports of the Treasurer of the Secretary were ordered read on the minutes.

communication from Jas. T. Mayor of Washington, La. to a meeting to be held in Washington, Sept. 8th for the purpose of discussing the opening of the Court House into the Teeche and ordered filed.
A report of Professor Chas. concerning the recent examination held for the scholars to the Southwest Louisiana Normal Institute was read. Lillian Herpeche having the highest average was, on the part of Mr. Gates, seconded by Boykin and carried, declared parish appointee to the vacant arship. President Sanders directed to adjust the difference existing between the Police and City commissioners; that Committee had met with the commissioners and that, subject to approval of the Jury, an agreement had been reached by all past accounts were read to August 1st, 1915; and further, that in view of the fact that the City Jail had been closed, that hereafter City prisoners would be admitted to the parish prison; provided however, the City of New Iberia would contribute, pro rata, for light water service and for fuel in heating the prison. On the part of Mr. Jacob, seconded by Gates, this agreement was approved by the Jury.
Mr. Jacob moved that the President be authorized to install in

would be done by the Parish at his expense.
On motion of Mr. Landry, seconded by Dr. Boykin and carried, the following ordinance was adopted:
Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of Iberia Parish, in regular session assembled, that from and after this date, all timber land owners in Iberia Parish, shall furnish a sworn statement to the Assessor when rendering their assessments, all timber cut and removed from their lands, giving a full description of the land cut over as well as the number of feet of timber removed therefrom.
Sec. 2. Be it further ordained etc., that all saw mills, shingle mills, sash, door and blind factories, and other wood working establishments, shall furnish a sworn statement to the Assessor, when rendering their assessments, of all timber purchased by them from owners of timber lands, situated in Iberia Parish.
Sec. 3. Be it further ordained etc., that any one violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before any Court of competent jurisdiction, shall be fined not less than \$_____, nor more than \$_____, or imprisoned for not less than _____ days or more than _____ days, or both, at the discretion of the Court.
Mr. Walter Y. Kemper having filed maps, township, plats and reports to the President fifteen days prior to the meeting in compliance with his contract, asked that the sum of \$1000.00 be paid him from the funds on deposit for the purpose of paying for the Parish map. On motion of Mr. Jacob, seconded by Mr. Landry and carried, the Secretary was instructed to draw a joint check with Mr. Kemper for \$1000.00 demanded.

A communication from Mr. G. W. Dallas requesting certain repairs to the East Side Road leading from New Iberia to Olivier, was on motion of Dr. Boykin, seconded by Mr. Jacob and carried, referred to Mr. Walet for attention.
A petition from residents of the 8th Ward for an appropriation to dig a canal to drain a certain section contiguous to Jennerette was presented. On motion of Dr. Boykin, seconded by Mr. Gates and carried, an amount equal to ten per cent. of the cost of the proposed canal was appropriated for the purpose.
Road Foreman Lourd submitted an estimate of the cost of rebuilding the Drouet switch showing an approximate cost of \$465.00. Mr. L. C. DeBlane for the Avery Island Road Committee stated that Mr. Drouet would sell the derriek for \$500.00 and that the Shadyside Co. would pay \$200.00 if the Parish would assume the payment of the other \$300.00. It was moved by Mr. Landry, seconded by Dr. Boykin and carried, that the Committee be authorized to purchase from Mr. Drouet the derriek, seals and switch, and that Mr. Melhenny be requested to pay the required \$300.00 for account of the Parish, provided, that the Shadyside Co. agrees to re-establish the derriek seals and

derriek at some point along the Morgan, Louisiana and Texas, Salt Mine branch within one hundred days from the date of the purchase.
Mr. L. C. DeBlane reported that the Franklin and Abbeville Railroad had placed 36 inch tiling under their road bed in the vicinity of David Junction, and that these furnished insufficient drainage for the road. On motion of Mr. Deleambre, seconded by Dr. Boykin and carried, the Secretary was directed to write to the Superintendent of the Franklin and Abbeville Railroad and demand the removal of these 36 inch tilings and the substitution therefor of boxing of the same size of the ditches which they serve.
Mr. Jacob moved that the Secretary be instructed to notify Mr. Marcel Derouen to remove obstructions placed by him in the Petit Anse Coteau canal when constructing a bridge across said canal; as these obstructions prevented with the free flow of water and interfered with navigation at that point, this was seconded by Mr. Landry and carried.
Mr. Boutte asked for the construction of a bridge on Rhodere Road where it crosses the Coulee, agreeing to do the work necessary to place the road in use for the coming harvest. On motion of Mr. Landry, seconded by Mr. Gary and carried, a committee to consist of Dr. Sanders, Mr. Romero and Mr. Jacob was appointed to make such improvements and repairs to the Rhodere and Commercial Canal Roads as they deemed to be necessary; and further, that the above named committee be authorized and empowered to appoint a committee of freeholders to expropriate a right of way through the property of Mr. R. H. Morrell that the road may be straightened.

Messrs. Numa Miguez and Adolph Comeau appeared before the Jury and proposed to give free of cost, to the Parish, five feet in width by the length their respective properties, for the purpose of digging a ditch and to widen the Petit Anse Road, provided that the existing canal through Mr. Miguez field be utilized to drain the road. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this agreement was effected.
Messrs. Jules Olivier and Willie Patout requested permission to change the course of the road along the new canal being dug in the neighborhood of D'Albor's property. On motion of Mr. Landry, seconded by Mr. Gary and carried, a committee to consist of two members of the Police Jury and two from the Bayou Carlin Drainage Board was appointed, with full power to act in the matter of the change requested. The President appointed Messrs. Romero and Gary from the Jury and Messrs. H. Boutte and Jules Olivier from the Bayou Carlin Drainage Board.
On motion of Mr. Landry, seconded by Mr. Gates and carried, the same committee appointed to assess damages and expropriate from Pierre Babineau and Mrs. Fernin were also empowered to serve to assess damages and expropriate from Antoine Romero, land sufficient to construct the proposed road to Lafayette Parish through his property.
Mr. G. O. Pharr asked to be permitted to work the Burke Station Road where it traverses the property of Dr. Harrison, on motion of Mr. Jacob, seconded by Mr. Landry and carried, this work was deferred until Mr. Lourd could reach that point.
On motion of Mr. Landry, seconded by Mr. Romero and carried, the Secretary was directed to prepare a statement of all amounts spent by each Ward of the Parish for road work during three years.
On motion duly seconded and carried the meeting adjourned.

CHECKING THE CUTWORM.

One of the most successful ways of checking cutworms is achieved by the use of poisoned bait or bran-mash. The bait is easily prepared by dipping freshly-cut clover or some succulent vegetation in a solution of poison and scattering handfuls in places frequented by the worms so they will go to the lure. To make the other preparation, mix a small amount of white arsenic or Paris green in each pound of bran as will be needed for size of patch, sweeten by adding syrup or cheap molasses, and saturate it all with water. The juice of a lemon or orange also mixed in it is claimed to make it more savory to insects which operate just above the surface of the ground. Scatter this mixture where the worms occur, placing it out on the ground in the evening so it will be in readiness for the night and not dry too quickly. The caterpillars will then eat it in preference to attacking the plants, and consequently get a dose to cause their death. Care should be taken to keep poultry and other farm animals, as well as children, from having access to it.
Protecting plants with old tins cans having tops and bottoms removed, or by other devices, is frequently employed by gardeners. Tinned cardboard disks each being provided with a slit cut to the center so that the card can be slipped around the stem of the plant at the surface of the ground, are quite inexpensive and furnish a lasting guard against attacks.—E. S. Tucker, Entomologist, Experiment Stations, L. S. U.
