HEAVIER WAR BURDENS PLACED ON BRITISH.

London, Sept. 21.—The greatest budget in the world's history was introduced in the House of Commons today by Reginald McKenna, chancellor of the exchequer, as another step toward meeting the war, which is now costing Great Britain nearly five million dollars daily. New military requirements and increased methods of warfare created overnight additional expenses. These had not been met with, even in the comparatively recent estimates of Lloyd George, the minister, necessitating this budget. Today's budget is the heaviest since the outbreak of hostilities, calls for the most drastic war-reaching taxes in the history of the country and involves free trade.

Large Imports.

After automobiles, bicycles, picture films, clocks, musical instruments, glass and hats will pay a 33-1-3 per cent ad valorem, as Mr. McKenna explained, the objects of such tax are "purely temporary and regard to a permanent trade," being primarily to discourage imports and to bear remained unchanged by the new schedules. A principal blow fell on the existing tax on imports not only being jumped 40 per cent but its scope widened so that even working men pay only \$14 weekly. The healthy must contribute to the government more than a third revenue. The 1-cent mail abolished entirely and the hereafter carried in the rate on telegrams, 12 cents for twelve words increased to 18 cents, and there to be a proportionate increase in telephone charges.

Burden on Sugar.

War tax, though largely abolished, will mean only an extra pound for the general for the sale of all sugar is regulated by the royal commission which will reduce the price of refined sugar and dealers. The debate on the budget was held but it was apparent that Mr. McKenna's suggestions were received by a unanimous vote. The speaker said incidentally that he had occasion to call on the army for another war loan.

WOMEN AS CHAUFFEURS.

"In my opinion," says a New York judge, "no woman should be allowed to operate an automobile. In the first place she hasn't the strength, and in the second place, she is very apt to lose her head." While the Louisville Courier-Journal has not been heard to defend women's rights in a political way, it rallies to her support when it comes to acting as engineer for an automobile.

"Women of the class who drive their own automobiles," says the Louisville paper, "with few exceptions, do not go to road houses, get drunk and drive home at high rate of speed, with an unsteady hand at the wheel and an unsteady eye on the road. It is asserted that women lose their heads more often than men in moments of excitement, but the assertion is easier than the proof. A majority of accidents which do not occur from drunkenness are caused by overconfidence. Men, as a rule, are more confident than women. Boys are still more confident. It is not often that sheer physical strength averts accidents or that the lack of it causes accidents. But many women, in these days of athletics, are as strong as the lads in knickerbockers who are permitted to drive automobiles. "The woman at the wheel sometimes menaces traffic because

of an inbred tendency to expect way to be made for women in all circumstances. Some women drive as if they expected the provisions of traffic ordinances and the rules of the road to be reversed in their favor as a matter of courtesy, a seats surrendered to women in street cars and in drawing rooms, or hats removed in elevators. When a woman drives an automobile without reflecting that there is sex equality under traffic ordinances, and under state road laws, and that to expect exhibitions of chivalry to the sex at crowded crossings or upon narrow country roads, is to invite tragedy, the feminine hand at the wheel courts blood. But there is no reason why women who are level-headed and consider of the rights of others should not drive automobiles. There are, of course, many persons of both sexes who threaten life and property whenever they drive motor vehicles. Among them are all men who frequent cafes and 'liek up highballs,' and then trust themselves to drive."—Beaumont Enterprise.


