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SEWERAGE BOARD ELECTION

It will be noted by perusing another column of The Enterprise that the City Commissioners were compelled to create another Sewerage District of the City of New Iberia in order to have the Board of Commissioners re-elected in accordance with law. It was only within the last three weeks that it was discovered that the present Board, as it was constituted under the law was null and void, in so far as their offices were concerned. This makes it imperative on the part of the Board of Trustees to call another election as soon as all formalities are complied with. It is unfortunate that the Sewerage election has to be delayed for upwards of ninety days more. The sentiment of the people of New Iberia is for a small annual tax, providing it cover a long period of years, which would enable them to meet the payments without any hardships. Were it not for the fact that the Water Works and Electric Light tax of three mills will expire in 1917 there is no doubt any of the advocates of the Sewerage tax would hesitate before burdening themselves further. They all realize however that sewerage is absolutely necessary and are perfectly willing to carry out the wishes of the State Board of Health. The Board as now constituted is as follows: Edward Estorge, Fritz Dietlein, Jules Dreyfus, Chas. L. Provost, Lazard Kling and Chas. Gougenheim. There will be no change in the personnel of the Board as the entire community are perfectly satisfied no better selection could be made, and we feel assured these gentlemen will do their best for the entire community in seeing that every dollar brings one hundred cents worth of value once the work be started.

Parker as a Bull Moose aspirant. Mr. Parker comes out squarely opposed to Prohibition, evidently thinking it will enable him to get the support of the whiskey dealers of New Orleans but substitutes the Woman's Suffrage cause to the tail of his kite to get the influence of the women of Louisiana who are clamoring for the rights of franchise. While we have no objection to the woman being accorded the same privilege of citizenship that the men enjoy, knowing that they are entitled to recognition, it is a forgone conclusion that the great Bull Moose leader knows very well that when the women vote, Prohibition is bound to follow and it would have been far better for him to have come out in the open for a dry State. Mr. Pleasant on the other hand says that he would veto any Prohibition bill, even if it was passed by the Legislature as he stands for local option when the people desire it. Dr. Pierson is also a local option candidate and says that he will sign the bill if it is passed by a legislature fresh from the people. The contest promises to be a hard fought one and already Mr. Parker has opened up his headquarters in the city of New Orleans and will make an aggressive campaign. There is no gainsaying the fact that this District will give Mr. Parker not less than five thousand majority, but in so far as the balance of the State is concerned, we have our

THE FAIR AN UNQUALIFIED SUCCESS.

The manager and promoters of the big industrial and live stock Fair held in this City last Friday, Saturday and Sunday deserve the unstinted praise of the entire population. From every standpoint it was one of the best exhibitions of public thrift ever exhibited in Louisiana, outside possibly of the Shreveport and even in this, our poultry department is said to have made a better showing. On Saturday and Sunday the visitors who witnessed the Fair numbered between twenty and thirty thousand and every one left New Iberia with nothing but praise for the management and the way the crowds were handled. One gentleman stated to us that he had visited the Fair at Shreveport last year and some five years ago took in the Missouri State Fair at Saint Louis and while they both had more live stock on exhibition there was none exhibited that showed up any better than the stock of Iberia Parish. Another commendable feature about the attraction here which was noticeable to the visitors was that there was no gambling features or anything in connection with the show which was objectionable to any one. Excursions were run in from as far as Beaumont, Texas and hundreds of citizens of that city and Orange made their first visit here on that occasion. Not one single individual showed any sign of intoxication on that day, which also bespeaks much for our community. The board of management held a business session, this morning and we understand they were all unanimous in making the Fair next year surpass their first effort and we feel assured they will have such encouragement on the part of our people to make it a grander success. Let every one put their shoulder to the wheel next year and the Board of Directors of the Fair Association will undoubtedly make the next live stock show worthy the visit here of visitors within a radius of two hundred miles.

NEW ORLEANS SWEEP BY STORM.

New Orleans, La., Sept. 30.—Ten persons are known to have been killed, 150 injured and property loss exceeding a million dollars caused by the destructive West Indian hurricane which struck this city at six o'clock last night.

At intervals the gale swept through the city at a velocity of 120 to 130 miles an hour, according to figures of the local weather bureau. The average velocity between 5:30 and 7 p. m. was in excess of 80 miles an hour.

Many schools and churches have been damaged. The famous French Market has been partly demolished and the Masonic Temple is a partial wreck, the roof of the tower having collapsed. More than 8000 telephones are out of order.

Owing to precautions taken on receipt of weather warnings yesterday, damage to shipping is slight except to small craft. The downtown hotels and public buildings were filled with residents seeking refuge from the gale, who were marooned there throughout the night.

At 9:30 o'clock the hurricane had subsided.

Railroad and wire communication out of this city has been cut off and telephone, electric light and trolley service discontinued in the city. All railroads have annulled trains from New Orleans.

Wireless communication from New Orleans was interrupted by the failure of the electric plant but messages were sent from the steamship Excelsior at dock here and relayed from the steamship Creole, anchored below New Orleans, in the Mississippi river, to Mobile.

Water Rises Above Seawall.

Mobile, Sept. 29.—The levees have given way in the lower Mississippi river below New Orleans, houses have been washed away and dead bodies sighted in the stream, the Southern Pacific liner Creole reported by wireless to-night.

Lake Pontchartrain had risen 12 feet and the water has risen above the seawall early in the evening.

Automobiles are bringing people into New Orleans from that section.

Milneburg and another town on the lake report that the water is in the streets.

Several hundred passengers on the Southern Pacific No. 8 from Houston are marooned on a ferry below Avondale, La. The train was due at New Orleans at 8 o'clock. The ferry is stuck on a mud bank and four tugs are standing by.

Six fishing schooners have been blown ashore at Riochets.

One of the railway car barns here was blown down.
