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### GOV. HODGES SAYS PROHIBITION PROHIBITS.

The Prohibition meeting which took place at the Court House last Saturday night at eight o'clock was not as largely attended as it might have been had the hour been set earlier in the evening by those in charge. Despite that fact, however, there were number of ladies and gentlemen present to hear the distinguished ex-Governor Hodges of Kansas discuss the question. The meeting was called to order by Rev. J. H. Tutz of the Methodist church who made a few remarks, calling upon Rev. R. R. Diggs to act as chairman. Rev. Mr. Diggs then introduced the gifted speaker after explaining the purpose of the meeting. Gov. Hodges held the attention of the audience for at least one hour in the most forceful manner and made many converts to the cause which he is espousing. He discussed the question solely from an economic standpoint. It was very forcibly impressed upon his listeners that prohibition was enforced in Kansas. A part of his address was about as follows:

and should be far ahead of Kansas in the matters in which Kansas in reality is far in the lead. His figures apparently were taken from authoritative sources, and his comparisons were not creditable to Louisiana, though there was nothing offensive in his utterances. He said the railroads of Kansas are required to make monthly reports of the shipments of liquor in the state, and these statements show that Kansas spends \$150 per capita yearly for liquor; while Louisiana, with about the same population, spends \$45,000,000 more annually. Kansas, he said, has the greatest per capita wealth of any state in the Union, which was one item showing how prohibition had ruined her. He took up some statements in facts, a local publication, which had said that the tax rate in Kansas was so high that the state was about to repudiate its bonded debt. He said the bonded indebtedness of Kansas is one and one-half cents per capita, while that of Louisiana is \$7.00. Kansas has \$1800 per capita of wealth, while Louisiana has \$360. The tax rate of Kansas is 12 cents on the \$100, while that of Louisiana is 60 cents.

He said that when the cry for relief went up for the stricken Belgians he issued a proclamation calling upon the farmers of the state to give one bushel out of every 100 they produced for the Belgians, and on the merchants to supply the money to grind it into flour and for its transportation. The result was that Kansas sent early 62,000 barrels of flour to the Belgians, and when the Governor of Missouri, a "wet" state, asked him to join in sending a full ship's load of flour to

Belgium, he replied that Kansas had already sent two ship loads, but that there were several thousand barrels to come in and he would cheerfully lend to Missouri all of it to make up her ship load. He paid a high tribute to the Kansas City Star, and said that in five years Kansas City would be dry through the wonderful courage of that paper, which he proclaimed to be the greatest journal in the country.

Gov. Hodges was followed by Rev. A. W. Turner, who at once went into the discussion of the coming campaign of the State. He mentioned the three candidates in the field, referring briefly to John M. Parker's attitude on prohibition and then devoted his time to a denunciation of Colonel Pleasant and a laudation of Mr. Barret.

### PLEASANT FOR GOVERNOR.

Now that Dr. Pierson has withdrawn from the race for the Democratic nomination for Governor, it leaves the field clear for a test of strength between Attorney General Pleasant and Lieutenant-Governor Barret, with a clear-cut issue between them—prohibition.

It is indeed unfortunate that Mr. Barret, in his desire to keep from being absolutely eliminated from the contest, on account of his position on the Constitutional Convention proposition, has seen fit to grab the prohibition question by the nape of the neck and drag it bodily into this contest. At the extra session of the Legislature, when the laws affecting the shipment of liquor into dry territory were passed, and every thing done to help those sections which had voted dry to have actual prohibition, it was tacitly understood that the prohibitionists would make no effort at this time to wage a State-wide prohibition fight, and they the (prohibitionists) have kept the faith, for at the meeting of the Anti-Saloon League in Alexandria, a few weeks ago, it was agreed that no fight would be made at this time, but the Lieutenant-Governor, floundering around for some issue that might gain him a few votes and enable him to at least make a respectable showing in the primary election, grabbed the standard of prohibition, raised it on high and called on all true prohibitionists to follow his lead. Now just the idea of Tom Barret being a prohibitionist! If he has ever been a prohibitionist, then the people of Caddo (his home) have never discovered the fact, and from the further fact that a great number of prohibitionists—men who have been true to the cause or years—are supporting Mr. Pleasant, it looks as if his death-bed conversion is not taken seriously.

Col. Pleasant has announced that he stands for local option with the parish as the unit, as it is to-day, and thus the issue is made.

However, it is not because Barret is a pro and Pleasant an anti that we have decided to lend our assistance to the latter candidate, but because of the fact that the people of this parish were almost unanimous in their opposition to the holding of a Constitution Convention at this time, and it was Mr. Pleasant who boldly took the stump in opposition to the Convention and made the fight for the people; nor did he stop to consider the effect that it might have on his political future.

Those of us who opposed the Convention owe something to Mr. Pleasant and we can best show our appreciation of his valuable services by nominating him in the January primary.

### MEETING OF THE PARISH DEMOCRATIC EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

New Iberia, Oct. 21, 1915.

The Parish Democratic Executive Committee met on this day at noon pursuant to adjournment. Present—A. J. Maumus, Chairman; M. W. Fisher, secretary; Ernest Bonvillain, George F. Winters, Massena Broussard, I. W. Gajan, Edmond J. Broussard, Jr., Henry Landry, Dr. Paul N. Cyr, O. P. Romero, R. P. Ribbeck, by proxies, Jos. Norres and Simon Thibaux.

A quorum being present the Chairman called the meeting to order, when after stating the object and purpose of the meeting on motion of Mr. R. P. Ribbeck, seconded by Mr. I. W. Gajan, the following resolutions was unanimously adopted:

Whereas the State Democratic Central Committee has called a Democratic Primary Election for the State Officers for the 25th day of January, 1916,

Be it resolved by this Committee that pursuant to Section 4 of Act 49 of 1906, a Democratic Primary Election be held throughout the Parish of Iberia on January 25th, 1916, to nominate candidates of the Democratic party for the following Parochial and Ward Officers to-wit:

2 State Representatives; one Sheriff, 1 Clerk of Court, 1 Assessor, 1 Coroner, 1 City Judge for the 6th Ward, 1 City Marshal for the 6th Ward, 1 Police Juror for the 1st, 2nd, 3d, 4th and 5th Wards, 3 for the 6th Ward, 1 for the 7th Ward and 2 for the 8th Wards, 1 Justice of the Peace and one Constable for 1st, 2d, 3d, 4th, 5th, 7th Wards, 2 Justices of the Peace and two Constables for the 8th Ward, two members of the Executive Committee from each Ward and five members at large.

Be it further resolved in the event a second primary be necessary that it be held on February 22d, 1916 at the same polling places and with the same Election Officers officiating at the first Primary.

Be it further resolved, that any person desiring to become a candidate in the above primary election, shall within ten days from and after the issuance of the above call, and not later than the 31st day of October 1915, at midnight, file with A. J. Maumus, Chairman of this Committee at New Iberia, his written notification of his intention to become a candidate at said primary, accompanied by a declaration that he is a duly qualified elector under the Constitution and Laws of this State, and that he is a member of the Democratic party.

Be it further resolved, that for the purpose of defraying the actual expenses to be borne by the candidates as provided by law, the candidates are hereby assessed in the following sums to-wit:

- Candidates for State Representatives \$10.00.
  - Candidates for Sheriff \$50.00.
  - Candidates for Clerk of Court \$30.00.
  - Candidates for Assessor \$25.00.
  - Candidates for Coroner \$15.00.
  - Candidates for City Judge \$15.
  - Candidates for Marshal \$10.00.
  - Candidates for Jolice Jurors, \$2.50.
  - Candidates for Justice of Peace \$2.50.
  - Candidates for Constables \$2.50.
  - Candidates for Member of Executive Committee no charge.
- And the amounts so fixed and assessed shall be paid by the candidates at the time of filing his written notification of candidacy. Failure to make payment will debar such candidate from having his name placed on the Official Ballot.
- On motion of O. P. Romero, seconded by R. P. Ribbeck, and carried this meeting was ordered adjourned to the 1st day of November to receive and act on the written notifications of Candidates filed with the Chairman as above provided.

### POOR POLITICAL JUDGMENT.

While a number of dissatisfied office holders in Louisiana are helping to boost John M. Parker as candidate or governor, they ought to remember that he is the same man who helped to give us the present reform administration which is rapidly drawing to a close. It was the Hon. John M., who went to Monroe and discovered the present incumbent for governor. Following the success of his candidate, he became an ardent admirer of Theodore Roosevelt, and he jumped the Democratic party for the second time in his career.

While it is admitted by all who know Mr. Parker that he is a splendid citizen, big-hearted and honest in his intentions, no one is ready to concede that he has a monopoly on these fine qualities. And in spite of all the qualifications of Mr. Parker, his political record is not of the kind that will appeal to the electorate of Louisiana. Recently the New Orleans States among other questions put the following to the Bull Moose candidate:

"Can he defend a financial management which has spent more money than the alleged extravagant administration which preceded? Which has put the State head over heels in debt? Which has brought about the collapse of its fiscal system? Which, instead of inaugurating those economies which he pledged the people, has brought a condition which can only be relieved by putting new burdens of taxation on the citizens of the State?"

"We have no idea that John M. Parker will attempt to make

these defenses. No one realizes more keenly than he what a sorry mess the present administration has made or the reform movement of which four years ago he was the Plumed Knight.

"But neither do we believe that the people of Louisiana are going to be fooled again by the Hon. John M. Parker. A burned child dreads the fire. A people who have passed through the crucible of the past three years and a half can hardly be expected to choose for governor the man, estimable, earnest and honest though he may be, who in the last analysis is the man most responsible for the infliction on the State of an administration which has done so much to bring reproach to the name of reform as applied to political movements in Louisiana."—Assumption Pioneer.
