NEW IBERIA & NORTHERN MAY EXTEND ITS LINE.

Judging from the telegram below which appeared in the New Orleans papers last Monday, it seems to look like the New Iberia and Northern Railroad will soon be made a trunk line of no little consequence, should the plans of Mr. Perkins materialize. It is the intention from what we learn to extend the road from its present terminus in St. Mary Parish into New Orleans on an air line through Thibodaux which will shorten the distance over the Southern Pacific towards of ten

miles. From Port Barre it will proceed west to Washington and Leesville and thence to Paris, Texas, a distance of approximately five hundred miles. There is no doubt this being the central point New Iberia will be given such ear shops that will prove very profitable to our people and it behooves all of us to leave nothing undone in the way of securing this advantage. The franchise that this road has received and the business they secure out of this City puts us in line for these benefits and we feel sure all of the officials have a kind spot for New Iberia in their hearts, consequently the citizens of New Iberia all have high hopes of seeing their shops placed here which is the logical point. The news dispatch here follows:

"Mr. A. T. Perkins, president of the New Iberia and Northern Railroad and Marshall and East Texas Railway, spent Saturday in New Iberia in consultation with Messrs. R. J. Lockwood, vice-president of the former and Bryan Snyder of the latter line. It is known that the last named gentlemen have for the past several weeks been engaged in the preparation of data relative to the formation of a through line from Paris, Texas to New Orleans and a reconnaissance has been made. The use of the New Iberia and Northern and the Marshall and East Texas roads as integral parts of this through line is contemplated, their financial interests being affiliated to some extent. Consideration has also been given to the acquisition or lease of the Paris and Mt. Pleasant and possibly other short lines which might advantageously become portions of the system.

The data and estimates prepared by Messrs. Lockwood and Snyder have been turned over to Mr. Perkins in a complete form for use in financial circles."

SUMMARY OF WORK OF CIVIC LEAGUE.

The Civic League of New Iberia was organized on Sept. 21st, 1911, the first meeting being held in the City Hall, the meeting place being subsequently changed, through the courtesy of Mr. W. W. Fisher to the Enterprise building. The Knights of Pythias and Mr. Fred Patout of Hotel Frederic have since extended to the League a similar courtesy. The members present at the first meeting of the Civic League were: Mesdames J. R. Davis, Emily Grant, D. A. Dimitry, Marjorie Galliard, A. B. Murray, Sarah Barnard, Walter Carstens, Charles Carstens, Miss Lizzie DeValcours, Mrs. J. R. Davis presiding.

The Corresponding Secretary has been requested to make a summary of what has been accomplished by the Association from its foundation. It is feared that this summary will be more a record of efforts to work good for New Iberia than of actual accomplishment. However, into these efforts have gone so much good will, so much unflagging energy, so much love for the municipal and moral good of our home town that the efforts do go on record with actual results as a brave struggle in the face of the most depressing period in the history of this part of the country, experienced for years.

The League has countenanced and encouraged by its presence, often in a body, every public-spirited, progressive movement which has taken place in New Iberia, the policy of the League being always to co-operate with the municipal authorities and to take authority in public affairs only when it has been courteously extended. In this manner has the League accepted and disbursed for the painting of Court House and improvement of Court House grounds, money advanced by Police Jury and City Council.

Advocating adoption of Commission Form of Government, Chamber of Commerce. Protests to authorities against the Beulah Binford motion pictures and an indecent exhibition of a young girls' deformity; requests to merchants to discourage the selling of cigarettes to minors. Donation from League's treasury of ornamental lights in Court House square. Writing to Washington to re-establish lighting of Post Office large lights. Entertaining of Mrs. Julia Truitt Bishop of New Orleans Times Democrat and of Miss Elizabeth Kelley of Department of Home Economics of Baton Rouge. Assisting at inauguration of the Interurban Electric Road and presentation to Mr. Crosby, its promoter of a handsome walking cane. Giving prizes to public school children for excellence in spelling. Establishment in school of Junior Civic League. Encouragement of home industries, no matter how modest, and insisting upon merchants pushing their sale in preference. Advertising New Iberia through the distribution of pictorial pamphlets to visiting Lawyer's Convention, Home-Steid Convention, Red Men's Convention and State Agricultural Demonstration train. Welcome to Sanitarium in New Iberia by a Linen Shower to Dr. J. W. K. Shaw for use in Sanitarium. Putting before the public for sale, the Pictorial advertising envelope of New Iberia. Making strenuous efforts by petition and interviews with public officials, correspondence with owners at distance and other methods to obtain the old Week's place as a public park, successfully obtaining consent and co-operation of City authorities to purchase same. The plan, however fell through owing to the lack of municipal means. Assistance in preparing for the Parish Fair of September, and active work in decorating for the event.

In conclusion we would wish to give full credit and unstinted praise to the faithful few who in the face of difficulties have attended meetings and worked for the accomplishment of the good

in which the League has been concerned. It is not the Association showing the largest membership which makes itself felt in the community but it is the Association showing the greatest number of earnest thinkers and untiring makers for the good aims in view. We, of the League have not met with the proper appreciation or co-operation from the generality of women in our town; often times sneers and laughter and misapprehension have been our share from New Iberia's womenkind. They have often made little of what we have accomplished and complained of what we have not accomplished. However, "hope springs eternal in the Civic League and perhaps some day our ladies, speaking of the generality not of the exception, may be less occupied with the duties which now fill their days, and may become fine active members of the Association which is so anxious for the uplift and advancement of their home town, the dearest spot on earth to the loyal.
