New Iberia, Nov. 22, 1915. The Board of Trustees of the City of New Iberia convened this day with Mayor H. S. Sealy presiding, Mr. Villerman present, absent Mr. Suberbielle.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved on motion of Mr. Villerman, seconded by Mr. Sealy.

On motion of Mr. Sealy, seconded by Mr. Villerman, a motion of thanks was offered to the gentlemen that served as Clerks and Commissioners of Election on Monday, Nov. 22d, at which election the Sewerage Commissioners were elected; said service being gratis.

The following bills were read and ordered paid on motion of Mr. Villerman, seconded by Mr. Sealy: L. Lewis, oyster shells, 65c; H. B. Jewell, connecting heaters, City Hall \$2.75.

On motion of Mr. Sealy, seconded by Mr. Villerman the meeting adjourned.

New Iberia, Nov. 23d, 1915. The Board of Trustees of the City of New Iberia convened this day with Mayor H. S. Sealy presiding, Mr. Villerman present, Mr. Suberbielle absent.

The purpose of the meeting was to promulgate the returns of the Election of Sewerage Commissioners for the First Sewerage District of the City of New Iberia, La.

The returns from the Sixth precincts as submitted by the Commissioners serving at the election held November 22d, 1915, were submitted and after comparing the list of voters and the tally sheet the following ordinance was on motion of Mr. Villerman, seconded by Mr. Sealy and adopted by the following Yea and Nay vote: Yea, Messrs. H. S. Sealy, L. F. Villerman; Nay, none.

Be it ordained, by the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the City of New Iberia, La., that acting as a Board of Supervisors, we have this day canvassed the returns of the election held on Nov. 22d, 1915, as submitted by the Commissioners and Clerks serving in the six precincts in the City of New Iberia, and after comparing the tally sheets with the list of voters, find all in accord and do hereby disclose the following result:

That for the office of Sewerage Commissioners, Mr. Jules Dreyfus received 81 votes; Mr. Ed. Estorge received 81 votes; Mr. Charles Gougenheim 78 votes; Mr. Lazard Kline 79 votes; Mr. Charles Provost 76 votes; Mr. J. W. Taylor 3 votes; Mr. Fred Stafford 2 votes; Mr. Lester Stafford 1 vote; Mr. H. Lagard 1 vote; Mr. J. Stafford 1 vote.

Be it ordained that the five gentlemen receiving the greatest number of votes are to be the elected Sewerage Commissioners of the City of New Iberia, La., and that after careful examination and tabulation, find that Messrs. Jules Dreyfus, Ed. Estorge, Charles Gougenheim, Lazard Kline and Charles Provost, having received the highest number of votes we do hereby declare them elected to the office of Sewerage Commissioners of the First Sewerage District of the City of New Iberia, La. Be it further ordained that a copy of this ordinance promulgating the returns of the election held be sent to the Secretary of State and that be duly published in the official journal as provided by the City Charter.

Thus done, read and signed in open session at New Iberia, La., on the 23d day of Nov. 1915.

17,400 SERES TAKEN PRISONER.

Berlin, Nov. 25, via London.—Large numbers of Serbians were captured by the Austro-German forces at Mitrovitsa and Pristina, the occupation of which was announced the capture of 10,000 Serbians at Mitrovitsa and 7400 at Pristina.

The official announcement respecting the Serbian campaign follows:

"The army under Gen von Koevess took about 10,000 Serbians and nineteen cannon near Mitrovitsa. In the Pristina swamps and on the Sitnica river 7400 prisoners and six cannon fell into our hands. The amount of war material and other supplies is important."


