New Iberia, La., Dec. 14, '15.

Fred Decourt, Laodice Delcambre, E. J. Gary, H. P. Gates, R. A. Jacob, Leon J. Landry, O. D. Romero and P. C. Walet; Absent, Mr. F. J. Druillet.

THE CALL.

New Iberia, La., Dec. 7, '15.
Dear Sir—By direction of the President, Dr. J. Wofford Sanders, I have to notify you of a Special Meeting of the Police Jury to be held at 10:30 o'clock A. M., Tuesday, Dec. 14th, 1915.

The object of the meeting is to further consider the advisability of disposing of the Parish mules, and to take such action relative thereto as the Jury may deem proper.

The Secretary submitted a report showing that the cost for feed for the mules for the preceding twelve months had amounted to \$1072.29. On motion of Mr. Walet, seconded by Mr. Decourt and unanimously carried, the action of the Jury at the meeting held on the 2nd of December, ordering the sale of the mules was rescinded, and the Secretary instructed not to advertise them for sale.

Mr. Gates moved that Mr. Lourd be required to submit monthly reports to the Jury of all feed purchased as well as the amount on hand; and also, of amounts spent in treatment of sick mules and of all other expenses incurred for their upkeep. This was seconded by Mr. Walet and carried.

It was moved by Mr. Gates, seconded by Dr. Boykin and carried, that the call of the meeting be extended to include any and all business which might be presented for consideration.

The matter of repairing the approaches to the Petit Anse bridge was again presented to the Jury by Mr. Jacob, on motion of Mr. Landry, seconded by Mr. Decourt and carried, the President Attorney be requested to appoint a committee to consist of three members of the Jury and three tax payers, from the vicinity of the bridge, who would investigate and decide upon the necessary repairs to the approaches; and the members of the committee, selected from the Jury, were authorized and directed to cause such repairs to be made without delay.

Mr. Boykin reported on behalf of the committee to investigate the Grand Marais drainage, that the clean-cambre from the Jury, Messrs. Homer Delcambre, Albert Delcambre and Thelesphore Roberson, recommended that the chaux from the tax payers, Mr. Romero asked that Lourd be assigned to grade a road along Jack's Coulee from the bridge at Olepsie Broussard to Lydia, when the work now being done on the Commercial Canal was accomplished. On motion of Mr. Jacob, seconded by Mr. Gary and carried, this request of Mr. Romero was granted.

Mr. Decourt moved that Warrants issued during the year 1915, may be used for the payment of Parish Taxes for Marais be referred to Dr. Boykin and to Mr. Gary, this was duly seconded and carried.

On motion of Dr. Boykin, seconded by Mr. Jacob and carried, the Secretary was instructed to request the District Attorney to have legal notice upon Messrs. Patout & Labou and upon Geo. W. Dallas to cause approaches to be constructed on the rice fields across the road opposite their respective fields.

H. B. Hewes, Vice-President and Treasurer of the Jeanerette Lumber & Shingle Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Louisiana and domiciled in Iberia Parish, appeared before the Police Jury and requested permission for his Company to construct a bridge over the Bayou Teche connecting its property located on the sides of said Bayou in the town of Jeanerette. After discussion and consideration of the request, Mr. Jacob introduced the following Resolution which being seconded by Dr. B. was unanimously adopted:

Resolved by the Police Jury, in meeting held on the 14th day of December, 1915, that acting under and in the name of the authority contained in the Revised Statutes of the State of Louisiana, Section 139, The Jeanerette Lumber & Shingle Company, Limited, of Jettie, Iberia Parish, Louisiana, is hereby granted and given the right and privilege to construct a bridge over the Bayou connecting its property, situate in the Town of Jeanerette, to a bridge to be located three hundred and fifty feet above the low water mark of the Bayou, the property lying on both sides of the Bayou Teche. A blue print of the location of said bridge being annexed hereto for reference and made part of this resolution.

On motion of Mr. Landry, seconded by Mr. Jacob and carried, the President was authorized to employ Mr. Lourd and his crew to construct the Public Roads, where necessary, when the weather permitted regular road work allowed.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the Secretary was instructed to notify John Braquet to repair all bridges broken by rains on the public roads of the Parish.

Mr. Decourt moved that the President Attorney be requested to appoint a committee to consist of three members of the Jury and three tax payers, from the vicinity of the bridge, who would investigate and decide upon the necessary repairs to the approaches; and the members of the committee, selected from the Jury, were authorized and directed to cause such repairs to be made without delay.
