ACT OF INCORPORATION OF THE PEOPLES WAREHOUSE CO., INC.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Iberia. Be it known that before me, the undersigned authority, personally came and appeared Emile Gajan, a resident of the Parish of Iberia, whose Post Office address is New Iberia, Louisiana, Charles A. Poirson, a resident of the Parish of Iberia, whose Post Office address is Jeanerette, La., and C. A. McGowen, a resident of the Parish of Iberia, whose Post Office address is Jeanerette, La., who declared, that desiring to avail themselves of the provisions of the laws of this State, with reference to the organization of corporations, do hereby form themselves and such others as may hereafter join them into the formation of a corporation and body politic for the purposes and objects and under the articles following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of the corporation shall be Peoples Warehouse Company, Incorporated, and its domicile shall be the Town of Jeanerette, Parish of Iberia, State of Louisiana; and under its corporate name it shall have power and authority to contract, sue and be sued, and to make and use a corporate seal and the same to break and alter at pleasure; to hold, receive, convey, purchase, alienate, improve, sell, borrow, pledge, mortgage and hypothecate under its corporate name property, real, personal and mixed; to name and appoint such officers, directors, agents and managers, or employees as desirable; to make by laws, rules and regulations for the management of its affairs and to do all acts and things necessary and proper or desirable to carry out the objects and purposes of the corporation.

The said corporation unless sooner dissolved in accordance with this Charter, shall exist and continue for a period of Fifty Years.

The President, and in his absence the Secretary-Treasurer, shall be the proper person upon whom citation or other legal process may be served, but should legal process be served upon any other officer as may be permissible under the provisions of Act No. 267 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana of 1914, or under the provisions of any other law, it shall be the duty of the officer or other party so receiving service, and he is obligated under the term of his acceptance, to bring to the prompt knowledge of the President, or in his absence, the Secretary-Treasurer, of the nature of the proceeding served upon him, and to take all necessary measures to secure corporate action upon the said proceedings in the event of the absence of the President and the Secretary-Treasurer.

ARTICLE II. The object and purpose for which this corporation is organized and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are declared to be:

The conducting of a public warehouse or warehouses to perform all of the functions which appertain to public warehouses, with authority to do business under the provisions of Act 156 of 1888 and Act 221 of 1908, and any other law or laws bearing upon the subject matter, receiving goods on storage, issuing the various receipts authorized therefor, making charges for the same.

ARTICLE III. The capital stock of said corporation shall be Five Thousand Dollars divided into and represented by Fifty shares of the sum of One Hundred Dollars each, which said stock shall be paid for in cash at the time of subscription, or the same may be issued at not less than par in payment or exchange for property or rights actually received or purchased by said corporation; and the same may be issued fully paid for money advanced or for other valuable consideration or services as the Board of Directors of said corporation may determine, provided that no stock shall be issued until the consideration therefor has been received by said corporation.

Every share of stock shall be made on the books of the Company at its office and on the surrender of the certificate therefor new certificates issued to the proper holder thereof.

The Capital of this corporation may be increased to Twenty Thousand Dollars. Business as soon as Three Thousand Dollars of the Capital stock shall have been subscribed and the proportion required by law paid in. The Board of Directors shall have the power to determine how much additional stock shall be issued within the limitations prescribed by this Charter.

ARTICLE IV. The full corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of Three Directors; provided that in the exercise of the full corporate powers in matters which extend beyond the usual authority of the Board of Directors, it shall be necessary for all Directors to concur in a proposition. Upon failure of such a concurrence, the matter shall be submitted to the stockholders in the same manner as though the corporate powers had been reserved. From the Directors shall be elected a President and a Secretary, who shall also be Treasurer.

The following persons, each of whom that he is the bona fide holder of a share of stock herein unpledged will constitute the first Board of Directors: Emile Gajan, whose address is New Iberia, La., and Charles A. Poirson, whose Post Office address is Jeanerette, La., and C. A. McGowen, whose Post Office address is Jeanerette, La.

Emile Gajan shall be President and Charles A. Poirson, Secretary-Treasurer. The said Board of Directors shall continue in office until the 1st day of December, 1917, on which date and annually thereafter, the Board of Directors shall be elected; the meeting of the stockholders being held at Two o'clock P. M. on the said day unless the same shall be a holiday, when the election shall be the following legal day thereafter; and the Board of Directors so elected shall proceed to the election of the officers herein above provided for, who shall hold office for one year.

Notice of the meeting of stockholders for the purpose of such election and for other purpose incident to the transaction of corporate business shall be delivered personally or by depositing in the post office properly addressed to each stockholder at least fifteen days before such meeting.

The Board of Directors shall appoint one stockholder to preside at such election as Commissioner. In event of the failure of the Commissioner to attend, the President shall by appointment fill the vacancy.

Any failure from any cause whatever to elect Directors the day named for the purpose shall not dissolve the corporation but the Directors in office as well as the other officers of said Company shall hold over until their successors are chosen. In such event the President shall cause another election to be held within thirty days, giving the notice required by law.

At every election and meeting each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote for each share of stock registered in his name and may vote by proxy.

The election of Directors shall be by ballot and a majority in amount of votes cast, each share of stock voted on to count for one, shall elect the person or persons for whom they have been cast. After each election the Board of Directors shall elect from their number the officers of this corporation. Vacancies shall be filled for the unexpired term by the remaining members of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE V. The Board of Directors shall frame and adopt such by-laws and rules and regulations as the affairs and the business of the corporation may require and as it may deem necessary for the conducting and management thereof, providing the same shall not conflict with this Charter or with the laws of the State and the United States. It shall appoint agents, employees, servants and clerk as it may deem proper, fixing their compensation, term of service, and dismissing them at pleasure. It shall have the right to fix and determine the salaries of the several officers herein provided for.

ARTICLE VI. In case of dissolution or termination of this contract either by limitation of its Charter or from any cause, the liquidation of its affairs shall be conducted by one liquidator selected by the stockholders with all the authority granted by provision of Section 29 Act 267 of the General Assembly of 1914.

D. 1915, we, the undersigned F. J. Gaiennie, Joseph Bonin, P. C. Romero and Jos. F. Moore, members of the Jury Commission for the said Parish and State duly and legally appointed, qualified and sworn according to law met at the office of the Clerk of Court for the Parish of Iberia, in the Parish Court House in the City of New Iberia, La., on the 20th day of December, A.
