PEACE IN JUNE, SAYS ASTROLOGER WHO TOLD OF THE WAR'S APPROACH.

The only astrologer, so far as is known, who saw the coming of the European conflict several weeks before the war was declared, was L. Edward Johndro, mathematician, electrician and chemist, of Detroit, Mich. In June, 1914, Mr. Johndro wrote a letter to the Herald calling attention to the fact that the planets presaged difficulties in Europe and that the countries affected were Serbia, Austria and Russia. He added that the situation was most threatening for Europe's peace, but hoped it could be adjusted by diplomacy. This communication was printed in the Herald at the time, but attracted little attention then as no one dreamed that such a stupendous conflict could be possible in this country.

When questioned recently regarding his prediction for 1916, Mr. Johndro told the Herald that, after careful mathematical calculation, he sees peace by June 12 or June 13, 1916; not before.

This prediction is embodied also in the Adept, an astrological monthly, and in the January number, which appeared a week ago, Mr. Johndro had this to say about the Ford peace mission and the prospects of peace in 1916:

The Ford peace ship sailed from New York December 4 at 2 P. M. Venus was then in the ninth house of the heavens, which agrees with the purpose of the voyage—peace. But Venus is in Capricorn—and peace lies buried; moreover, Venus applies to opposition of Saturn on the fourth house—the outcome of the mission looks disappointing.

"The moon in the seventh house indicates much public opposition abroad. Yet the moon trine to Saturn and Jove, and these in trine indicate the mission will eventually have a good moral effect one to six months hence. The moon's trine to Jove in the twelfth measures five to six months hence—suggesting peace overtures may succeed by May or June, 1916. This seems to be the earliest possible period warranted by this figure and the horoscopes of the European rulers.

"Further, the war began near the time of the solar eclipse in 27 deg. 25 min. Leo; it can hardly end until Mars shall have passed over and away from this point. Nor will the British lion be waned to peace while Mars remains in Leo.

"Again, the European zenith at the time of the eclipse was Virgo. How can the astrologer expect peace until Mars shall have culminated?

"Perhaps we may see peace by about June 12 or 13, 1916; hardly before."

It may be interesting to note that the much advertised astrologers of Europe, who publish yearly almanacs of predictions, had not a line about the war in their publications for 1914. One of them, Raphael of London, this year states in his almanac that no doubt his readers were disappointed when they saw nothing about this in the 1914 publication, but, while he saw the ominous signs of the conflict, he preferred not to say anything about it, thinking it would blow over.—New York Herald.
