MARIA FACTORY NOT YET SOLD.

In the last issue of the Louisiana Sugar Planter, published at New Orleans appeared among other interesting sugar items of news the statement that the Maria Sugar and Refining Co. which is owned by Hon. Adrien Gonsoulin had been negotiated for and sold to a syndicate of capitalists who would remove the mill in its entirety for operation to the island of Cuba, wishing to be better informed of the situation concerning this industry which means so much to the cane raisers of the Fourth Ward, we made it our business to interview Mr. Thomas Gonsoulin, the assistant manager, and he informed us that the plant had not yet been sold. In fact, he with others interested, would use their best endeavors to keep the Factory in operation if the cane growers of that section would contract to sell their cane to the mill as heretofore and not ship it to other refineries bordering on the Teche, when they paid the same prices per ton for the raw products. Mr. Gonsoulin requested us to mention to the readers of The Enterprise that he had met with considerable success in getting contracts signed up by people who heretofore sold to refineries at long distances and in all probability the plant would be retained. The negotiations for the sale of the mill were true, as the management had long since realized that the industry could not be operated further at Loreauville with such a light tonnage of cane when it had a capacity for as much as 70,000 tons. Last year the amount of cane supplied reached 11,000 tons which could hardly justify even a start of the mill. Of course last year the crop was exceedingly short, but now that prospects are bright for a large yield and the conditions have changed, Mr. Gonsoulin would reconsider, more especially if arrangements could be made to keep the cane in that section.
Now that the tariff is to remain on sugar neither Mr. Gonsoulin nor his sons feel inclined to dispose of their holdings and even if the present transaction is carried out another stock company would be formed for the erection of a smaller mill in that vicinity.
Speaking of the conditions as regard sugar, the Louisiana Sugar Planter, which is the mouthpiece of the organization takes a hopeful view of the situation and those who are still decrying the Democratic party would do well to digest the following:
"The sugar position, looking at it in a world-wide way could never be better than it is today according to many of the Louisiana planters, who expressed themselves as thoroughly well satisfied with the situation which is daily growing fairer. Louisiana planters who are now figuring on improvements both here and in Cuba say that the sugar stage is now set for the greatest period of sugar progress and

prosperity in the history of the industry. More money is being invested in sugar properties now than ever before. For a long time it was not considered as attractive a field for investment as many other industries, but within the past few months a very decided change has taken place amongst investors with regard to the value of sugar investments."

THE MACCABEE CELEBRATION.

Promptly at 11 o'clock, headed by the New Iberia brass band, there were in the parade to the Southern Pacific Depot fully one hundred and fifty loyal members of the New Iberia Tent No. 4 and about forty representing Croix Tent No. 5 of Jeanerette. At the station they were met by about seventy-five members of the Kaplan Lodge and immediately upon the arrival of Supreme Commander D. P. Markey of Detroit who had spent a few days at New Orleans, the parade was again formed into line by Mr. Ozeme Jacob and the march began to the New Iberia Opera House where the public speaking took place. The meeting was then called to order by Mr. Edmund Landry, the Commander of Tent No. 4 and Hon. Porteus R. Burke on behalf of Mayor Sealy, delivered a welcome address after which Mr. James Goins, the Deputy State Commander for this District also delivered a welcome speech on behalf of the Lodges of this section of the State. He was followed by Mr. Markey, the Supreme State Commander who expressed his pleasure upon greeting such a large audience upon his second return to New Iberia in the cause of Maccabeesism. He confined his talk upon the many advantages of the insurance feature of the Lodge and dwelt largely upon the urgent necessity of every man leaving something for his wife and children to keep them from being public charges upon the State.
