**New Automobile Guide Book now Available Locke's Good Road Maps of Texas.**

We have just received an advance copy of Texas and Louisiana Automobile Tours which also contains the best through route to New Orleans. This book seems to be about the last word in Automobile Guides and is sure to be popular with the touring public this season. New Iberia and Morgan City gets considerable prominence in its pages. A picture of Hotel Frederic and the LeBlanc & Broussard garage also adds to the appearance of the catalogue.

The 64 pages are well printed on good paper and the many half-tone illustrations eloquently picture scenes en route from the plains of West Texas to the lowlands of Southern Louisiana. The cover is very attractive and carries a clever padlock arrangement symbolizing the name of the publisher, Harry Locke.

Texas and Louisiana Automobile Tours was compiled from data secured while actually traveling by automobile over many of the most important highways of the State. When the next edition comes out it will contain many other routes which could not be mapped in time for this publication. The routes covered in this book are Corsicana Route, Dallas to Shreveport, Denison to Galveston, Fort Worth to Waco, Houston to New Orleans and Dallas and Fort Worth to El Paso.

Harry Locke, compiler and publisher of Texas and Louisiana Automobile Tours, has had a number of years experience in the field in charting and marking automobile highways of the Southwest. He has previously compiled several Tour Guides that are recognized as standard by motoring public and Automobile Clubs. **MR. PARKER'S BOSS.**

After you have heard Mr. Parker solemnly dedicate himself to the cause of boss destruction in Louisiana, we advise you to take up two planks of the Republican candidate's original platform and figure out for yourself what would happen if a miracle came to pass and Mr. Parker were elected.

One of these planks concerns the short ballot. The other refers to a constitutional convention.

Mr. Parker is for the short ballot. He wants the primary abolished and the Governor authorized to appoint the Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, Commissioner of Agriculture, Superintendent of Education and Register of the Land Office.

Also he is for a constitutional convention. But he wants a hand-picked convention composed of two from each congressional district and nine at large and all appointed by the governor himself.

Would the people of Louisiana, after having precipitated a revolution to obtain a voice in the selection of their public officials and after having in unmistakable terms declared against any convention which did not give each parish its proportionate share of representation consent to vest the tremendous power of choosing all the officers of the state and the farmers of a new organic law in the hands of one man?

Are they ready to create such a Boss as Mr. Parker proposes? Is it conceivable that they would make Mr. Parker such a Boss when in the case of Judge Coco he showed that he is so petty and so narrow and withal so lordly that he would not hesitate to crush any man with the nerve to criticize him?

If Mr. Parker could carry his policy to a final analysis he would make himself so powerful that it would be difficult to carry on an election against his will.

Would the people of Louisiana be willing, through the instrumentality of a convention of twenty-five automata to make a new constitution for the State, vitally affecting their property, their liberties and their lives, and jam it down their throats with which he seeks to brush Judge Coco aside?

The question answers itself. The people of Louisiana fought too bitterly to strip the Executive of his power to assume that they would consent to set up the kind of Autocratic Despot which Mr. Parker's platform indicates he would like to be.—States.
