BACK TO THE LAND IN ENGLAND.

In countless ways the European war is driving the belligerent nations toward state socialism. The latest manifestation of this tendency is the proposal of the British board of agriculture to seize by condemnation the great estates of the nobles, cut them up into small farms and lease them on easy terms, the state itself retaining the title to the lands.

Nothing ever proposed in a Lloyd-George budget was half so radical as this. The people are to have the land of which they and their ancestors, in so many cases, have been unjustly deprived for many generations. The owners will get only what the government sees fit to pay them. It is a drastic, direct attack on the British land monopoly, which has long been a greater burden on the nation than any monopolistic wrongs we have ever suffered in America.

It is meant not as a war measure, but as a contribution toward economic recovery and national growth after the war. The government recognizes that it may have difficulty in keeping its war veterans, particularly its able bodied and ambitious young men, at home when the fighting is done. War breeds a spirit of restlessness and adventure. Parliament may forbid emigration, but it is obviously preferable to make it so advantageous for young Britons to stay at home that they will not want to emigrate.

It is the inaccessibility of British soil that has been the chief cause of emigration. A few lords have owned one-fifth of the land. With the estates divided into small holdings and brought under intensive cultivation, there would be a living for all. Denmark, with a denser population than England, has exported food to England, simply because Denmark is a country of small farms.

The British soldier-farmers are to have the active co-operation of their government-landlord, in the way of co-operative banks, credit stores, etc.

The experiment will be well worth watching. We may learn some useful lessons from it, even though our own land problem has not yet become serious.—Beaumont Enterprise.

TEACHING THE YOUNG.

There is no doubt that we have no more important task than that of teaching the young. Education, like charity, begins at home. What the boy and girl learn from their parents, if they have good fathers and mothers, is of more importance than what they learn at school.

But parents should remember that admonition is not enough; example is necessary. It is not sufficient to tell your children what they ought to do; they are all from Missouri and require to be "shown." Deeds, not words, are most helpful. The parents who really possess the virtues have as a rule good children. Too often what seem to the fathers and mothers but little faults in their characters, when transmitted to their offspring become magnified into great vices.

At school we should have more vocational education. Too much of the teaching is imparted because the teacher knows it and wants to teach it, not because the pupil needs it. Our boys and girls should be first trained to make a living and then, in addition, given as much culture as they will take.

In the school, as in the home, the teacher sets an example of the greatest influence. The teacher, like the parent, must walk in the straight and narrow path, for the children are following after. This influence for good of teacher and parent can be strengthened by remembering that children are largely controlled by their affections; win their love and you hold the key to their hearts.—N. O. American.

London, Feb. 29.—According to Lloyd's the British steamer Southford, formerly the Sindbab, has been sunk. Eleven of the vessel's crew were saved. Two were killed. The Southford was a vessel of 897 tons.

CHARBON VACCINATION.

To the Live Stock Owners of the State:

Due to the prevalence of charbon last year, in various sections of the State, this Board earnestly advises early inoculation or vaccination this season, on the part of the live stock owners, in order to anticipate a recurrence of the infection and for the purpose of having their stock protected in ample time before the advent of warm weather, which is the charbon season.

In accord with Federal regulations, supervising the manufacture and distribution of biological products, this particular vaccine should bear a date of expiration not to exceed three months which will insure a better and more potent material, consequently more satisfactory results, this season.

Past experience has taught that best results are obtained when animals are vaccinated against charbon early in the Spring so as to allow thirty days in which to secure protection before the season approaches; when charbon infection usually develops.

The State Live Stock Sanitary Board strongly urges, therefore, that, in those sections of the State in which charbon infection has been known to exist in previous years, vaccination of animals should be commenced not later than March 1st. That is, the first dose, of a double dose vaccine, should be given at that time.

If stock owners will give this matter their careful attention, it will increase the number of protected animals at the beginning of the charbon season, and materially limit the spread of the disease, should the coming Summer prove favorable to the development of charbon infection.

HOW TO FIGHT HOG CHOLERA.

If Hog Cholera Appears in Your Herd.

Treat your hogs immediately with anti-hog-cholera serum, after which they should be kept on a light diet and pure drinking water and confined to limited quarters that may be cleaned daily and sprayed three times a week with 1 part of compound cresol solution to 30 parts of water until the disease has abated in the herd. To obtain the best results the serum must be administered before the disease has progressed in the herd.

To Rid the Premises of Infection:

Remove all manure and saturate with quicklime.
 Burn all litter, rubbish, and old hog troughs.
 After the premises are thoroughly cleaned, spray walls, floors, and other surfaces with disinfectant (1 part compound cresol solution to 30 parts water.)
 Wallow holes and cesspools should be filled in, drained, or fenced off.
 All runs underneath buildings should be cleaned and disinfected and then boarded up.
 Destroy hogs that do not fully recover, as they may be carriers of cholera infection.

NON PARTISAN TARIFF (SUGAR.)

President Wilson's recent open public and unequivocal statement that he "had changed his mind, and now favored a non-partisan tariff commission," so as to take the question of tariff out of politics has been a severe jolt to the political machine of this parish and district. This means that the politicians who have been riding sugar, for what offices would bring them in dollars and cents, have been knocked off of their equilibrium. Taking sugar, or the tariff out of politics, would mean that every time the politicians would enter a contest for an office the tariff would cease to be an issue and the merits and qualifications, as well as the honesty, morals, and integrity, to say nothing of the fitness of the men offered, would be issues. It would mean that the producers would cease being held up by professional politicians—cease seeing the hat passed around for the politician's interest, under the ridiculous and absurd pretense that it was for the benefit of the producer.

Taking the tariff out of politics, politically speaking, means that the Democrats will remain in National power at Washington for the next generation; for the producer it means more. It means for the producer that those interested in sugar will not have to be politicians first, but producers at least. Therefore, it can easily be seen and understood how such an announcement took the wind out of the Lafourche parish machine's sails. Think of a ring politician in Lafourche canvassing for sheriff, assessor, representative, police juror, and being forced to

talk about something else than the tariff on sugar, for which they have never been able to do anything, can do nothing, and will do nothing, and being forced to talk merits, men for men, capability and showing results. Perish the thought. To have spoken tariff heretofore in local elections was questioning the intelligence of our people—was absurd, was evidence that the real issues were best dodged by the politicians—just as "duty plus duty" is best dodged and ignored to befuddle and deceive the over-worked sugar producers.—Ex.

If a passenger liner or a merchantman carries mounted guns we cannot see why they should be entitled to immunity from the enemy and more than a regular cruiser or gunboat. Had the President lived up to the professions of neutrality which he proclaimed at the inception of the European war, our country could have easily avoided embroilment. But we have never been neutral, only in profession. Mr. Wilson and his cabinet are pro British and anti-German. Great Britain has heaped outrage upon outrage on our commerce and flouted all the protests of the government without provoking the resentment of the president or his secretary of state. On the other hand Germany has been hestored relentlessly. The American millionaires who are financing the European war and selling ammunition to the allies are instigating trouble between our country and Germany. The American millionaire has come to be a much greater menace to the peace and happiness of the United States than the socialist or the anarchists are.—Coast Herald.
