BIG PARKER MEETING.

EDWIN S. BROUSSARD,
GIVEN A GRAND OVATION.

As was expected the Progressive meeting which took place in the Elk Theatre building last Tuesday night was one of the biggest outpourings that ever assembled at one time in New Iberia to attend a political rally. Aside from the fact that Progressive adherents from every Ward in Iberia rallied to the call of the leaders to be present, several hundred strangers and visitors from every little hamlet between Morgan City and Crowley came to New Iberia to help swell the number. The fact that Mr. John M. Parker who heads the ticket for Governor failed to put in appearance was a great disappointment to many who were anxious to hear him speak. The Theatre building was really filled to overflowing as long as one hour before the speakers arrived and it was very necessary to hold an outdoor meeting while the big meeting was going on inside the Opera House.

Hon. John D. Walet of Loreauville presided over the meeting, the speakers being besides Mr. Broussard, Judge W. E. Howell, a life-long Republican; Judge E. D. Estilette, who also owes his allegiance to the same party and ex-Judge Mimos T. Gordy of Vermilion who characterized the New Orleans ring as a menace in the state, and called attention to the financial condition of the state, and deplored the fact that high salaries paid useless officials necessitated the cutting down of appropriations.

The judge then warmed up and commenced using the short and ugly word rather indiscriminately. He said, "When a man makes a statement of an alleged fact from a false premise, he may be excused, but when he deliberately and with a false knowledge of the fact that he is falsifying it with that knowledge he tells the people a untruth, he is nothing more than an ordinary liar. The people who are going about telling you that if John M. Parker is elected it means the encouragement of the negro to return to politics in our state, are nothing more than ordinary liars."

Rosen Raps New Orleans.
Charles Rosen of New Orleans was the next speaker. Mr. Rosen proceeded to amplify the fact that he came from a ring ridden, oppressed city, and that no man or woman could live in New Orleans even for a short while without realizing this fact. He predicted political slavery for the people if they did not rise in their might. He said that those who rebelled against boss rule paid the penalty through ring assessors. He declared that the attempt to bring the negro issue into the campaign was a joke.

"We do not fear the negroes," shouted the speaker, "what we do fear is the Indian. In New York these Indians call themselves Tammanyites, in Chicago they are Iroquois, but in New Orleans they are Choctaws. The negroes are not bothering about politics, but these Indians scheme by day and night. When they can swing an election straight, they may do it, but when there is no other way, they swing it crooked."

MAKING DIAMONDS.

A recent dispatch from Switzerland informs us that that country with its industry and commerce paralyzed by the war has found a source of compensation. The Swiss are making diamonds, we were told—real diamonds, by an artificial process. "The synthetic diamond has at last been discovered."

There may not be anything really new in this. A process for making diamonds was discovered by scientists many years ago, and is now common property. It involves heating pure carbon to a vaporizing temperature under immense pressure, and then letting it cool. As the carbon vapor condenses, it crystallizes, forming diamonds. But the discovery has been of no commercial use, because hitherto all the diamonds produced have been microscopic in size.

If Swiss experimenters have really found a way to make diamonds of commercial dimensions, the discovery is of great importance. It will mean vast wealth for those who control the secret. And inevitably it will mean the depreciation in value of all the other diamonds in the world. It was reported a few years ago
