### FIGHT ON FREE SUGAR NOW IS AT AN END.

Washington, D. C., April 20.—Following instructions from last night's caucus of Senate Democrats, Senator Simmons, chairman of the finance committee, today filed in the Senate a motion of recede from the Senate amendment to the House bill repealing the free sugar law.

This virtually ends the fight over sugar, although by unanimous consent the Senate postponed a vote on the question until Saturday in order to allow Senator Hardwick and other opponents of the legislation to make statements. The motion to recede will be taken up at one o'clock Saturday, and not later than five o'clock a vote will be taken.

The action means almost certainty that the original Kitchen bill, which was advocated by Senators Ransdell and Broussard, and the entire Louisiana delegation in the House, will be laid before President Wilson for his signature early next week.

The vote in the Democratic caucus last night in favor of absolute repeal instead of suspension until 1920 was 24 to 9. Senators Simmons and Stone, who were members of the conference committee, refrained from voting. Both, however, made speeches urging their colleagues to stand for the House bill. In doing this i was generally conceded they were advocating a position that was entirely satisfactory to President Wilson.

"It is a very happy result," said Senator Ransdell today. The best thing about the fight was the absence of the discord that has dominated other sugar fights in congress.

"In my opinion," he continued, "it will be a long time until free sugar is again considered seriously by Congress."

### THE CULTIVATION OF CORN.

The main object in the cultivation of corn is to establish a shallow mulch to prevent the escape of moisture from the soil, and incidentally to free the soil from weeds and grass. It is easy, then, to see that a flat, shallow cultivation, not over 2 or 3 inches deep, with an implement that least interferes with the root system will give best results. If the ground has erusted the first cultivation may be done with the section harrow across the rows before the corn is up. The same implement may be used profitably after the corn is up till it is 4 or 5 inches high, running the harrow diagonally or in a different direction each time. The first cultivation after the harrow should be done with a 7-tooth cultivator, or some similar implement. This cultivation must be thorough and establish a soil mulch all over the row that should be maintained all the time. To cultivate deeper would interfere with the tiny roots and cut off some of the food supply.

It is difficult to say how often corn should be cultivated as that will depend on the weather conditions. If it rains every week the ground will form a crust. This must be broken and the soil mulch restored, or the moisture will be lost by evaporation. Cultivation along this line should continue till the corn is in tassel, or even till silking time, if soil condition demands it.—J. L. Hoers, Extension Div., U. S. U.
