New Iberia was well represented at Baton Rouge during the first three days of this week. Some of the gentlemen who had the pleasure of visiting the Capitol City were Hon. Porteus R. Burke, who was chosen to represent the Third District at the National Convention on June 14th and Messrs. A. J. Maumus, Dr. Paul N. Cyr, Judge S. O. Nuckolls, J. E. Dupuy, Dr. J. Wofford Sanders, Dr. Henry A. King, W. L. Grant, Rudolph P. Ribbeck, W. O. Hugonin, R. Miguez, O. P. Romero and others. A number of the gentlemen who had been chosen to represent this Parish as delegates to the Convention were unable to attend for business reasons. The Convention was one of the largest for many years and Robt. Ewing of the New Orleans States was re-elected National Committeeman from Louisiana by acclamation.

It then behooves our good citizens to co-operate with the City officials and thus abrogate the necessity of them invoking the law to obtain its enforcement. One of the first changes he made in the Plant after assuming charge, was to put in a new separator and he hopes to get efficient results as a consequence of the change. Besides the manufacture of choice butter, Mr. Delembre will supply the local dealers with an excellent grade of ice cream. Success of the enterprise is going to depend more upon the interest the farmers take in its success than anything else. The products of the Plant can easily and readily be disposed of right here in New Iberia, but the milk and better fat must be procured in sufficient quantities to make it profitable to operate the Plant. It remains now for our farmers to lend their best effort in supplying the raw products. The gentlemen who, not only planned the erection of the Creamery in New Iberia, but furnished the necessary capital for its equipment did so, not with any idea of ever getting a dividend from their investment. It was solely to help put the farmer and owner of dairy herds in position to derive sufficient daily revenue that they would soon be enabled to go into the stock raising business with pure bred stock, which is so necessary to insure a profit to the business. Good stock can be cared for as cheaply as scrub cows and the sooner our farmers learn that it pays only when the herds are made up of milk producing stock, the better for all who engage in that line of business. If every user of butter will insist upon being supplied only with that raised at home, our country can then be made a dairy section and our farmers will, within a few years, become very independent. The best way to make a success of this infant industry is for every citizen to boost it and see that it secures the necessary milk every day so the Plant can be operated. Keep in touch also with the Board and manager and show them that you are interested in its success and will watch the outcome of their labors, always bearing in mind that it also devolves upon you to help the enterprise.
