### CAUSE OF VICE AND CRIME.

When the European war broke out there were several hundred persons detained at Ellis island by reason of their physical or moral unfitness, a considerable number being prostitutes, because there was no way of deporting them. As the war continued, hundreds of others were sent there from institutions as being likely to become public charges, or who, prior to entry to this country, had been convicted of or admitted the commission of a crime involving moral turpitude.

Thus the problem arose as to what to do with these "undesirables." The war prevented them being returned to their own countries, and Ellis island is not equipped to take care of a permanent population. The station was becoming crowded; the health of those detained was suffering from the confinement.

Luckily for the people of the United States, the port of New York has a commissioner of immigration equal to the occasion. Each case was examined on its merits. Men and women, even if they did fall within the inhibited immoral classes, were given a chance. Positions were found for them with responsible persons, and some were put in charge of relatives or friends. They were reported to Commissioner Fredric C. Howe the life they were leading, and what they were doing. Says Mr. Howe:

A tabulation has just been made of 360 persons released from custody on their own recognition, or to their friends, and of this number less than half a dozen have failed to make good. Many who were given employment at \$8 and \$10 a week are now getting \$20 and \$25 a week; they are accumulating savings.

All this is a remarkable demonstration of the fact that vice and crime are largely the result of poverty and lack of opportunity. When industrial conditions improve, when even the down-and-out-alien, unfamiliar with our land and institutions, was given a chance, and aided by a kindly word and a life, he has been able to make good and retrieve his past.

Here is a fine illustration which can be found repeated over again in the history of this and other countries, that "the wrongs of the world, the evil, the vice, and the criminal action of people are traceable back to the environment in which people live—to bad housing, to inadequate wages."

Policemen, and militia, and jails and courts of justice become necessary only because there are social wrongs that keep people poor, that make stealing, or even murder, the line of least resistance; and that drive men and women to excesses that would never have been thought of under proper social conditions.

Thus, the first duty of society is to give all an equal chance. After that has been accomplished, it will be time enough to interfere with individual liberty in the production and distribution of wealth in the endeavor to make the world better.

### 'CANNOT ACCEPT AT THIS TIME,' SAYS COL. ROOSEVELT.

Chicago, June 10.—Col. Roosevelt's answer to the Progressive convention follows:

"The Progressive Convention: I am very grateful for the honor you confer upon me by nominating me as president. I cannot accept it at this time. I do not know the attitude of the candidate of the Republican party toward the vital questions of the day. Therefore, if you desire an immediate decision, I must decline the nomination. But if you prefer it I suggest that my conditional refusal to run be placed in the hands of the Progressive national committee. If Mr. Hughes' statements when he makes them shall satisfy the committee that it is for the interest of the country that he be elected, they can act accordingly and treat my refusal as definitely accepted. If they are not satisfied, they can so notify the Progressive party and at the same time they can confer with me and then determine on whatever action we may severally deem appropriate to meet the needs of the country.

### THE OLD AND THE NEW.

The old manner of electing a president was quite different from the present plan. In the early days the process was for each elector to cast two votes for whosoever he chose. When these votes were counted the man receiving the highest number was declared president, and the man receiving the next highest was automatically vice president. There was no previous nominating conventions and published platforms. The popular candidates were "bunched" for the voting, and they told their views in speeches and later on through the newspapers.

In the first election, in 1789, Washington received 69 votes and John Adams 34, none of the other ten candidates receiving over nine. Thus were chosen our first high officials.

This process of selection continued until 1800, when Thomas Jefferson and Aaron Burr tied with 73 votes each, and the house of representatives had to make the choice, which resulted in Jefferson for president and Burr for vice president.

Aaron Burr was the last vice president selected by this second choice plan. Before another election the constitution was changed so that the electors voted for a president and a vice president together. Under this amendment Jefferson went to his second administration, with George Clinton as vice president. They represented the republican ticket, while their adversaries were the federalists. Since those days the voting has been on party lines.—Beaumont Enterprise.
