LOCALS

The Red Men and the Poehontas Degree will hold a joint installation of officers at their lodge room on next Monday evening. A dance will be given to those in attendance and refreshments will be served appropriate to the occasion.

Mr. Luke L. Bertrand of the Bertrand Lumber Company purchased this week for their factory, eight wood working machines for the manufacture of sash, door and blinds. These machines will be removed from the old dismantled plant of the Iberia Cypress Company and be installed in the Bertrand mill as soon as the building is remodelled for their reception. This Company proposes to go extensively into the making of sash, door and blinds and New Iberia will be in position to boast of having another large industry, which will give employment to a great number of skilled mechanics. As it is to-day, the only industry we have that employs more than one dozen men is the big mill of the P. L. Renouet Lumber Company. The loss of the Iberia Cypress Company which was shortly followed by the Gebert Shingle Mill discontinuing operations threw a large number of our people out of employment. The only industry of that kind we now have is the Renouet mill and the scarcity of timber is such that it does not operate as steadily as the management of that industry would like to see. We hope when Mr. Bertrand does get his sash, door and blind factory in full operation that our people will give it such encouragement that the owners will be able to operate the mill steadily the whole year round.

The Civil term of the Nineteenth Judicial District Court was convened into session on Monday and the new Grand Jury drawn which is composed of the following business men with Mr. C. F. Berard as foreman: J. D. Rose, A. A. DeBlanc, J. A. Segura, Albin Segura, Louis Indest, Sr., Edward Nereaux, Paul J. Herbert, A. Daigre and Marcel Derouen. The Jury has been at work all of the week ferriting out the cases that will have to appear before the Court to be decided upon by the Petit Juries. There are a great many cases which will have to come up before the Court as the jail is well filled with both black and white who failed to furnish appearance bonds.

The annoyance of certain loafers, both white and black who lounge around the Parish prison at all hours of the day and night has caused Sheriff Landry to have erected around the prison a wire fence that will keep them off at a distance unless they get orders to go into the jail yard on some good excuse, acceptable to the officers. Mr. Landry did well in taking this precaution because it was a very easy matter to slip tools into the jail by which those who wished to escape could easily do so. When prisoners are incarcerated therein, no one without a good reason should be allowed permission to hang around the windows to talk to the prisoners. The easier it is made for some of the chronic law breakers when they enter the jail, the less they care for the punishment that is being imposed upon them. It is very noticeable from the records that most of what is generally termed petty infractions of the Law is being done by the very same class of people. Confinement behind the bars does not seem to have any effect upon them and Mr. Landry seems to be determined to take some of the liberties from some of those who are sentenced to serve sentences at every session of the District Court.
