

**SEGURA FACTORY A POSSIBILITY.**

It was our pleasure yesterday to meet at our sanetum Messrs. Dennis P. J. Burguières, C. Patout Burguières and one of their representatives, Mr. Homer Dupre who has charge of their holdings at Segura. These gentlemen interviewed a number of our business men on yesterday, and more especially the members of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce with a view of finding out whether or not the people of New Iberia were desirous of seeing the Segura refinery which was destroyed by fire on August 12th, 1912 rebuilt or not. It goes without saying that the people of New Iberia as well as all of the farmers in this section will lend every encouragement necessary to induce these gentlemen to re-erect a mill in that vicinity as early as possible. One of the requirements necessary to get the gentlemen interested in re-establishing their industry here is an exemption from Parish taxes for a long term of years. This was readily promised by the citizens and assurances given by the Chamber of Commerce that they would see that the successors of the present Police Jury live up to this exemption if the promoters decide to make the investment in Iberia Parish. Segura is in such close proximity to New Iberia that every citizen should feel interested in seeing this factory established, if for no other reason that to better local conditions. It is proposed to issue bonds for the installing of this factory and remove a large mill off of the property of the Burguières Company, now situated at Eagle Lake Texas. Certain members of the Company interested in this factory expressed a desire to remove the plant to Cuba, but it is Mr. Burguières intention, if he meets with the proper encouragement on the part of our people to remove all the machinery to Segura and rebuild the factory at that point.

This factory, it will be remembered was destroyed about the month of August, 1912, and the last seasons operations the mill consumed 119,000 tons of sugar cane, dispensing throughout this section about \$1,000,000 in money for cane. Some \$36,000 was paid out for labor alone, most of which was spent in New Iberia with our merchants. It is useless for us to mention how pleased the people will be to learn that these gentlemen entertain the idea of rebuilding this sugar mill, providing they meet with tax exemption and certain other encouragement necessary towards consummating the deal. It behooves our people to get back of this project and give it all of the encouragement necessary and we feel assured every encouragement that can be given will be accorded the gentlemen in charge of the enterprise.

**GOOD ROAD BOOSTERS.**

On Monday afternoon at about 5:30 o'clock a large delegation of good road boosters from Galveston, Houston, Beaumont, Lake Charles and other towns and cities arrived here en route to New Orleans, over what is known as the old Spanish trail. The party was met on the Parish line by Mayor Sealy and a large number of citizens and escorted to Hotel Frederic where the visitors lunched. Some few minutes thereafter they all repaired to the Court House where a band of music was then striking chords, which made them all feel welcome and together with a large number of our citizens a public meeting was held and our guests related their experiences along the route to New Iberia. The meeting was opened by Mayor Sealy who expressed his regret upon seeing so few Iberians present on so important an occasion. He said there was no excuse for our citizens not attending the meeting when public notice had been given in ample time to enable them to attend. After extending his welcome to the visitors, he then called upon Mr. A. C. Bernard to act as chairman of the meeting. Mr. Bernard made a splendid talk on the necessity of good roads and then called upon the following visitors for a few expressions: George W. Graham, Houston; C. F. Kirk, Houston; F. W. Turnbow, Beaumont; H. S. L. Armodien, Orange; George Hathaway, Jennings; D. M. Foster, Lake Charles; B. L. Coghlin, College Station, Texas; H. B. Bayliss, Lake Charles. All of these gentlemen responded to the invitation of Mr. Bernard to discuss model roads and a great deal of valuable information was the result of the meeting. The boosters all remained over in New Iberia until the next morning when they continued their journey to New Orleans, stopping at all of the interesting towns along the route. Mayor Sealy and Mr. Fred Patout joined the party and made the trip to the Crescent City. The visitors were made as welcome as possible upon their arrival here and a pressing invitation was extended to them to stop over for a few days upon their return home from New Orleans.

**WHY WILSON IS PREFERRED.**

In an interview on August the 26th, Mrs. Joseph Fels in the following words told why she prefers Wilson to Hughes.

"I am for Wilson because he is a real democrat. That means that he is for his fellowmen at home and abroad. I am a German and I do not understand how the Germans of this country can fail to see that Mr. Wilson is their friend, just as he is the friend of his fellowmen in all countries. One can always count on his impartiality—that he will not favor any particular one because he is a friend to all. We can see by his acts that he really does this: they may not always show forth his intent; but if one waits long enough, one finds that the true intent and intelligence of the highest kind were there—an intent consonant, with the love for humanity. His foreign policy alone would entitle him to re-election. His internal policy, of course, adds so much the more to his desirability. What he has done gives us an earnest of what he will do, if one will use one's own intelligence to see through the mists engendered by the present world situation."

Speaking of Wilson's speech of acceptance a recent issue of the Public says: "One sharp ringing note of confidence, aggressiveness and purpose marks the document. 'From the close of the civil war, to the beginning of the present Administration, the Democratic party has been a party of irresolution. Sound principals it had, but it lacked the courage of its convictions. Dominated largely by the Southern wing, the despair of defeat crept in and spread throughout its ranks, until it sank into a moribund condition in which brilliant men momentarily raised aloft the torch of Democracy, only to see it extinguished for lack of support. It was unable at any point to meet its opponent, who, endeared to the country by its conduct of a successful war, and emboldened by the leadership of masterful men who were not afraid to prostitute public office for private gain, had only to say 'Boo!' to see it slink from the field. It was merely a party of opposition. It was opposed to everything the Republicans favored, but had no plans of its own. It opposed the protective tariff but was afraid to declare for free trade."

After lingering about three days from concussion of the brain, the venerable Mr. Antoine Pfister succumbed from his wound on Friday, Sept. 22d at seven o'clock. On Wednesday morning the old gentleman who occupied rooms in the Clero building over the Miguez liquor establishment had occasion to enter the lower floor and through some unaccountable manner lost his balance and fell flat on the cement flooring, inflicting such a serious wound that the unfortunate man could not overcome it. Deceased was well known in New Iberia, having resided here some fifteen years, following the occupation of a baker. From what we learn he was at the time of the accident in the employ of Mr. John Crouchet, although for upwards of six or eight years was in the employ of the Lampercz bakery. He was a native of France.
