SEA GULLS RENDERED HELPLESS BY CRUDE OIL.
Puerta Plata, San Domingo, Sept. 22.—Crude oil that had been thrown overboard by Uncle Sam's warships to quell the raging waters which destroyed the U. S. S. Memphis during the recent storm, stuck to the wings of sea gulls and other water fowl taking refuge in the bays along the coast, and rendered them helpless and unable to fly for several days. Members of the United States Marine Corps, on expeditionary duty at this place, captured hundreds of the birds with their naked hands. The oil-begrimed fowl wandered up and down on the beach, crying pitifully, while the Marines stood guard to see that boys did not harm them.
