—This season has undoubtedly been one of the best for our farmers that can be remembered, even by our older citizens, for the harvesting crops and more than sixty per cent of the cane farmers have already completed their harvesting. Were it not for the shortage of cars, many others, some distances from the mills would also have been through with their cane crop. The agriculturists have had everything their way this year from the time the crops were first planted and the consequence is not one per cent of either cane, corn, cotton or rice was lost and the price for all of these staple crops have never been better with possibly the one exception, that of rice. It behooves our farmers to continue the same policy and diversify as much as possible next year and we are told most of them will subdivide their lands and plant a little of each to be on the safe side again next season. Diversification of crops and living at home as much as possible instead of out of the stores, is of paramount importance if our agriculturists ever hope to become independent. Raise every conceivable thing at home by preserving whatever vegetables you can while they are in season, together with your lard and pickled pork and thousands of dollars that to-day find its way to the Eastern centers for these products that should be preserved here for future consumption will remain with the farmers. The general impression prevails that by the 25th of this month every sugar refinery in South Louisiana will be through and the mills closed down.

—Within the next ten days it is more than probable both the Gulf Refining Company and the New Iberia Oil Company will begin boring for oil on the Schwing-Goodwin tract and what is known as the Bollivar tract, opposite Olivier Station near Little Bayou. These companies have already completed their derricks and all that remains now is to get the machinery in operation to commence the work. The whole section where the indications are so pronounced is located in township 12 south, range 3 east. Leases and sub-leases have been given to numerous people interested in the development of this territory and within the next three weeks oil in large quantities should be brought to the surface, if indications amount to anything. It was fortunate for our people that the original promoters of this field held out sufficient inducements to induce the Gulf Refining Company to agree to sink test wells here, otherwise nothing would have been done to develop this property. If oil is found at Olivier it will be the making of New Iberia and already dozens of oil prospectors and speculators are coming to our little City to watch the development and otherwise secure holdings of oil lands in that neighborhood. It would be much better for the masses were gas found in large quantity and then the prosperity of New Iberia would be assured, as it would be the means of inducing industries of every conceivable nature to make investments here owing to cheap fuel. Since Shreveport struck gas several dozen large manufacturing plants have been erected in that thriving city and these same conditions would prevail in our midst.

On Tuesday, November 28th, at the Broussard's Cedar Crest Farm there was a sorrowful shock to the acquaintances of the Parrot, "Jacko", the property of Mr. Gustave Pesson which had belonged to his respected mother, Mrs. Gentie.

The bird was imported by Mrs. Gentie from Vera Cruz, Mexico, during the Civil War. When Mrs. Gentie passed to the great Beyond, Mr. Pesson came in possession of the pet and for the past eight years has been in the care of the Broussard family at their lovely country home.

The venerable bird was taken over when only a little wee parrot in the nest which makes him fifty-five years, more or less and was in the best of health until his death.

Immediately after his death he was packed up and mailed to the Professor of Taxidermy in the Tulane University where he will be mounted and returned to the

family to be kept as an heirloom. He will be remembered by many of the old residents of New Iberia who all will look back upon their childhood when they knew the bird so well.
