VACCINATE ANIMALS BY MARCH FIRST.

All animals should be vaccinated regularly where charbon once existed, and the owner should not wait until the disease has broken out, as it requires about one month from the first injection for the animals to become protected. It is better to set a date on which to begin vaccination each year. This should be allowed to pass without having the animals given the first dose of a double-dose vaccine. They ought to be protected by the first of April, as charbon, as a rule, rarely breaks out previous to that time.

The symptoms of charbon vary according to the channel through which the infection (germs) enter the system, and may be from sudden death, without any external signals, to sickness for a few days with swellings on the exterior of the body. Where the infection has been inoculated through the skin, a primary swelling will be seen at each point of inoculation. Hogs usually show swelling of the throat, which is sometimes mistaken for sore throat or quinsy. During the summer months, especially where charbon has previously existed, all cases of sudden death should be looked upon as suspicious of charbon, and the carcasses treated as such, as most of them are likely to have resulted from that disease, and it is much safer not to take any chances. Besides, the regulations of the State Live Stock Sanitary Board require this.—W. H. Dalrymple, Louisiana State University.—L. S. U. Press Bulletin.

RESERVE CORPS AND CIVILIAN TRAINING.

The National Defense Act which became a law on June 3rd, last, provides for a number of matters connected with the military training of civilians, which are new in our experience. In carrying out the provisions of this Act, there has been established a new office at these headquarters known as the Office of the Reserve Corps and Civilian Training. The office comprises four branches to cover the several phases of civilian training. These are the Officers Reserve Corps, the Enlisted Reserve, the Educational Institutions at which there is military training, and Civilian Training Camps.

These have become matters of National importance, and the great number of inquiries received in this office concerning this subject, show that the citizens of this part of the country are keenly alive to this matter and desire to be kept informed with reference thereto.

At the present time, the summer camps for civilians are demanding a great deal of attention, and I have instructed Major H. L. Laubach, 19th Infantry, who has charge of this branch of the office, to secure a list of the leading papers published in each city, and from time to time to send news letters to these papers, which may be published as matters of general interest.

AGREE ON HUNTER AS NAVAL OFFICER FOR NEW ORLEANS.

Washington, Feb. 28.—Judge E. G. Hunter, of Alexandria, will be the next naval officer of the port of New Orleans. Senators Ransdell and Broussard reached an agreement today on Judge Hunter after considering a large number of applications for this post. The secretary of the treasury will be requested tomorrow to recommend the appointment of Judge Hunter to the President.

Since Jared Y. Sanders was elected to Congress from the Sixth district, systematic campaigns have been conducted by a number of well known men in Louisiana in an effort to succeed him as naval officer. That the senators had no easy task in making this selection is evident from the fact that they had to confer before a decision was reached. One of the important factors in the selection of Judge Hunter is the fact that the Eighth congressional district has received no patronage during the entire four years of the Wilson administration.

This argument was pressed actively in Judge Hunter's favor. The same argument was used in favor of the Seventh district. No resident of this district is holding any office coming under senatorial patronage. The office of surveyor of customs, however, had been awarded to Robert L. Knox of that district, who later had to vacate the post.

Judge Hunter was born and reared in Rapides parish. He is the son of Col. Robert A. Hunter, who formerly was secretary of state of Louisiana. He is sixty-four years of age and has spent all of his adult life in the practice of law in Alexandria. He ranks high as a criminal lawyer and has been retained in many of the important criminal cases which have arisen in Louisiana during the past generation. He was a Wilson delegate at the National Democratic convention at Baltimore in 1912.

The naval officer at New Orleans receives a salary of \$5000.
