PEFISTER BROS.

—Again we wish to call the attention of our readers, and more especially to our farming element that next Monday is set apart as Visitor's Day at the State Experimental Farm. Dr. Mauldin, the genial and courteous superintendent in charge is hopeful that every one interested in the important work carried on by the Farm will make it their especial business to visit the Farm on that day. A program has been arranged that will be interesting and instructive to all who are seeking information along scientific lines and it behooves our agriculturists and business men to lend their presence there next Monday.

—Statistician J. A. Babin of the Agricultural Department of Uncle Sam again furnished us with a detail report of the cotton crop of the State of Louisiana during 1916. It was noted that Iberia is credited with only four hundred bales of the fleecy staple. Inasmuch as there was only two gins operating in this Parish last year, a great portion of the crop found its way to Vermilion, St. Martin and Lafayette parishes, consequently they got the benefit of it. Mr. Babin informs us that Iberia will raise not less than two thousand bales during the present season judging from the amount of acreage planted in cotton by our small farmers. Cotton being an early crop our farmers were wise in making preparations to plant a large acreage and with the bounteous prices prevailing our agriculturists should prosper.

—Some time since, in fact on several occasions we called the attention to our business men of the urgent necessity of our citizens maintaining a rest room where visitors to New Iberia could find comfortable seats and conveniences that are necessary when strangers come here from long distances. During the Woodmen Convention session this week it was very evident that New Iberia needed a place of this kind, to accommodate the ladies at least as well as the gentlemen who instead of standing on the streets unprovided with seats, would have taken advantage of a resting place in between the sessions of the two Conventions that was held here and they would have appreciated it more than one would have an idea. This condition confronts us every day when we have shoppers from the rural districts. As a suggestion, we would recommend that our Board of Trustees fit up the place in the City Market which is now used as a Police Headquarters. It is an ideal location for a rest room if it was provided with sanitary conveniences and made large enough to have two rooms, one for ladies and the other for gentlemen. A few hundred dollars would easily make the place comfortable, and the investment would be a good one. Of course unless a matron was employed to stay there and accommodate the guests it would be a hard matter to get the women to take advantage of it, unless that was done it would probably be a waste of money. Magazines could be put there to be read during the leisure of the guests of the rest room. These could be provided, if subscribers for them would consent to send their reading matter there after they would have finished with it themselves without any cost to the City. We feel certain if a few of our business men would bring this matter to the attention of our City Fathers something could be done towards an early consummation of a real nice rest room.
