**MILITARY TRAINING AND
BACK YARD GARDENING.**

So many of our readers are
imbued with the idea that Pre-
paredness is simply a matter of
military training and guns and
ammunition, that they lose sight
of the fact that the raising of
food stuff is equally, and if needs
be, far more important in this war
is to be brought to a successful
termination on the part of the
United States. It is a well known
fact that food supplies are short
in this country as well as those
in which we are allied, and unless
the farmers of the South as well
as the entire United States do
their part and that quickly, real
suffering will soon be apparent
in many sections of the country.
It should be borne in mind that
the man who raises food products
helps in a vital way in ameliorat-
ing conditions of that nature and
he is providing the first requisites
towards caring for the military
who has to go to the front.

In this respect those who can-
not go to the training camps,
could, and in fact should lend
their best efforts towards seeing
every idle piece of land intensively
cultivated. Even if one grows
only enough vegetables to sup-
ply his own needs, he at least
shows an inclination to prevent
the depletion of general stocks.
At the same time it will tend to
prevent fictitious values on food
stuff until the time comes when
the Government will step in and
remedy the conditions that af-
ford the speculator a chance to
rob the public.

It is also well to remember
that even every turnrow that now
is left untouched by the farmers'
plow could add materially to ad-
ditional food stuff, and in that re-
spect the people would not suffer
for want of the necessities of
life, nor would the armies feel
the pinch of scant rations at any
time during the duration of the
war in which we have become in-
volved.

With plenty of labor in this
section, back yard gardens should

be the slogan, so let every man
who can spare the time get his
seed, and his spade and prepare
to assist the Government in sup-
plying food stuff and it would
make a much greater force in the
settlement of this conflict.

THE LEVEES.

From what we learn in con-
junction with Presidents of other
Police Juries within the Atchaf-
alaya Basin District, Hon. A. A.
Theriot is exerting his best ef-
forts to see that protection is af-
forded the levees during the com-
ing high water from fanatics
whose delusions might lead them
to believe that the inundation of
areas of cultivated lands, and the
consequent interruptions of rail-
road traffic would be a benefit to
the enemies of the United States.
In this respect it is well that all
the Police Juries in the State
make appropriations towards
having the levees in Louisiana
guarded day and night. At the
present time the water has al-
most reach the top of the banks
of the levees in many places and
thousands upon thousands of
acres of farm products would be
destroyed were the levees tamper-
ed with. It is well that steps
be taken at once to guard against
such incidents of this nature
before too late, and we trust Mr.
Theriot will succeed in getting
the assistance of all interested of-
ficials who should look after these
important matters.

On April 16th, Mr. Theriot re-
ceived the following resolutions
anent the situation, which he
handed to us for publication and
of which we reproduce in part:
"Baton Rouge, April 16, '17.
President Police Jury, New Iber-
ia, La.:

At a largely attended Mass
Meeting held at Port Allen this
day for the purpose of arranging
for the protection of the levees on
the river front, it was unan-
imously agreed that to secure the
proper cooperation of all the
parishes in the district, the un-
dersigned committee be appoint-
ed. We earnestly urge the ap-
pointment of a like committee
from your parish and from every
other parish in the district to ef-
fect an organization to be known
as the Atchafalaya Basin District
Levee Protection Association. We
believe that a fund of Twenty
Thousand Dollars will be required
and believe that this amount
should be apportioned as follows:
Atchafalaya Basin District Board
\$10,000; Police Jury of the parish
of Iberville \$1,000; Police Jury of
Parish of West Baton Rouge,
\$1,000; Point Coupee \$2,000; Ter-
rebonne \$2,000; St. Mary \$2,000;
Lafourche \$800; Assumption
\$500; Ascension \$300; Iberia
\$200; St. Martin \$200. During
flood seasons in the past we have
had to contend against the forces
of nature only but under present
conditions, contingencies may
arise which require the most
prompt and forceful measures
and we must be prepared. The
water now in the lower Atchaf-
alaya river is with a few inches
of the highest point reached dur-
ing the flood season of 1916 when
breaks (supposed cutting) a few
miles below Melville, reduced the
flood level during the balance of
the season. Kindly advise your
action in this matter with the
least possible delay.

should be planted to food crops in
order to avert stark-naked want
this fall and winter. This is no
idle talk, but a reality now on us.
Who will do these things? You,
me and all the people, must be
the answer.

cure to be unfurled on the campus

contributed something towards
its accomplishment. A vote be-
ing taken among the number, as
to whom should be selected to
christen the flag staff, this dis-
tinguished honor fell to Miss
Marie Bertram, one of New Iber-
ia's brightest young ladies.
The program was commented by
the school children singing "The
Star Spangled Banner," led by
Miss Eva Sehexnayder, another
of that school's winsome young
ladies, after which Mr. Bahou
made a few remarks, introducing

speaker of the evening. Patriotic
