Those of our citizens who have been anxiously awaiting the construction of the proposed sewerage system in New Iberia will again be disappointed at the turn of events when the Board met last Tuesday. There were four proposals made to do the work and every one of them was far in excess of the amount now in safe keeping in our banks for this important civic improvement and the only thing the members of the Sewerage Board could do was to reject them and call for new bids. Material of every description having advanced as much as forty per cent, it is doubtful whether the Board can sewer the entire district embraced in their blue prints. Our people however can rest assured that every effort possible will be made by the members of the Board to do the best thing possible for New Iberia in the way of getting the most for the least money. It would be unfortunate if this improvement was not put underway this summer, not only because we need the sewerage so badly, but because of the employment it would give to a large number of our people.

—On Friday night of last week the Liettemeyer estate suffered the loss by fire of their large barn, stocked with grain which had been stored in the barn for the use of their stock. Had not Mr. Fred Liettemeyer been on the place at the time every head of stock on the plantation would also have been burned to death. As it was he managed to open the stable in time to save the stock. The flames were first discovered in the left and spread so rapidly that nothing could be saved. An alarm was sent in to Iberia No. 2 and they managed to get there in time to save adjoining buildings by the use of their chemical apparatus. This auto fire truck has already paid for itself since our City Fathers brought it here to replace the service of the two horses in use before the purchase of the truck. The investment was a good one and even those who had reason to doubt the wisdom of its purchase are now loud in their praise of the up-to-date fire equipment.

The Board of Reviewers (Police Jury) has been in session for the past ten days adjusting the assessments of the property holders of the Parish. They have already completed the rolls in the First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Wards with but few changes in the assessments from what we could learn. Those of our citizens whom they see fit to raise because of under assessment will be advised to come in and register their objections to the Board before the rolls will be sent to the Auditor at Baton Rouge. Almost daily numerous property holders from different sections of their Parish made their appearance in person, but so far we have heard no one complain that their assessments were not what it should be. It will be several days yet before their duties are concluded after which Assessor Fremien will forward them to Baton Rouge for their acceptance.

—On Thursday afternoon Judge Power again imposed a fine of \$200.00 upon a liquor dealer for violation of the Sunday law, the infraction occurring on Sunday last when liquor was dispensed contrary to the State law. It is hard to conceive how some of our dealers persist in violating this law when on numerous occasions, both Judge Power and his predecessor Judge Nuckolls imposed as much as a \$300.00 fine on the guilty ones brought before the City Court. Upon interviewing His Honor after the trial of the case of Thursday, he made it clear to us that he intends to enforce this law as well as the Gay Shattuck law whenever charges are made by the officials which result in convictions before his Court. Of course it is not his intention to do police duties as many citizens believe, and in this he is correct. This duty falls solely upon the police officials who are paid to perform this function of the Court and then it remains for the parties accused to be proven guilty and when the evidence shows their guilt is the time when the Court will carry out the mandates of the law. The fact that a dispenser of liquor is confronted with fines and probably imprisonment when selling liquor on Sunday should of itself make them hne to the line as regards the Sunday law, but oftentimes it is disregarded in this City irrespective of the fatal consequences. The case was appealed to the District Court for final decision.
