WORK IN THE GARDEN FOR JULY.

What can I plant this month? This is the question asked by many. Very little can be done in the garden as the season for summer planting is over. We must now get ready for Fall, however, if you have any land unoccupied, you may try a few of the following: Cucumbers for pickling, endive, corn, radish, late varieties of cauliflowers. At the end of the month, Bush and Pole beans, success will depend entirely upon the condition of the weather.

Those who are contemplating making a Fall garden, now is the time to commence. The first to give your attention to is the cab-

bage crop, as this is the most important for fall and winter.

The next consideration is the variety to plant. The mistake made by many is to grow the large and late sorts, the demand is for early and medium size, weighing from three to eight pounds. They are the most profitable as a greater number can be grown to the acre.

It will be useless and time lost to grow cabbage on poor soil, the land should be well fertilized. If stable manure is not available, then use commercial fertilizer. It will be more profitable to plant only one acre in soil well prepared and fertilized, making a full crop of headed cabbage than have a lot of loose leaved unsaleable. Be careful not to plant cabbage on the same land that

cabbage had been grown on, the previous year.

Seeds of all varieties can now be sown until the end of August. The following named varieties will head in Succession Early Jersey Wakefield 90 to 100 days. Steins Early Flat Dutch 100 to 110. All Season 110 to 120. Sure head 110 to 120 days.

The All Season is one of the best all around cabbage for gardeners, stands all kind of weather—slow to run into seeds—does not burst early and weighs from four to ten pounds. The late sorts are the Late Flat Dutch. St. Louis Late Market forming very large heads is not desirable for market. In buying seeds be careful to get the new crop and the varieties above named.

After the beds have been prepared and plants set out—thea comes the trouble with cut worms, green worms, and cabbage flies. For cut worm poison bait must be used. To one pint of wheat-bran, one teaspoon of Paris Green. Mix the Paris Green with the bran until the poison is thoroughly scattered through the bran, then add sufficient quantity of syrup to moisten same. Scatter a small quantity near plants set out, which should be done in the evening as the worms generally put their appearance at night. That is the time they do their damage.

You can also destroy cut worms by examining plants that are cut down every morning. By digging around the plants you will find one or two worms.

For green worms use lead Arsenic. To one gallon of water, two teaspoonful. Spray plants during dry weather. Chickens should be kept out of the garden as they are liable to eat worms that have been poisoned. For cabbage flies use tobacco dust.

Do not think of sowing turnip seeds until the latter part of August. A great many sow too early. They do not succeed and then the seedmen is to blame.


