

LOUISIANA SUGAR SITUATION.

The Louisiana sugar situation has been greatly clarified and the price definitely fixed by the action finally taken in the matter Monday. It called for some sacrifices on the part of the planters, who will get less than they expected and less than they would have received had the sugar been sold at the prevailing high prices caused by the sugar famine in the East. The planters suffered a number of misfortunes of late, from hostile legislation, storms and unfavorable climatic conditions, which have cut down several of their recent cane crops; indeed, the present crop will be lower than seemed probable some weeks ago, as the recent early freeze in portions of the sugar district has reduced the output. It was hoped that the planters were recouping part of their former losses because of the higher price promised for sugar. It was natural for them to seek to get the prices, as the growers of wheat and other crops.

On the other hand, the Food Administration was created to deal with just such conditions to protect the general public from excessive prices for necessities at the same time it made adequate allowance to producers of a fair profit on their output. On this basis, the price was fixed, and finally unanimously accepted by the planters, after consultation with the Louisiana food commissioner, John M. Parker, who did all in his power to secure the best terms, both for the public and for the cane growers. That most of the latter were actuated in this matter by a spirit of patriotism, recognizing that they like all other good Americans, are called to make sacrifices in order to win the war. If there were some who hesitated on the price, they saw the folly of attempting to override the federal government, so strongly entrenched as it is with the great and almost arbitrary powers granted it by the food bill, and did not press the matter. It was made clear that any opposition would be speedily and easily suppressed under the power to refuse licenses to those who would not accept the federal orders and

prices, thus closing their places. The incident has made clear the fact that the Federal Food Administration can do what it was created to do in the way of fixing prices. It is to be hoped that it will show equal firmness and power in dealing with other products; and that the sugar planters will not be asked to bear the brunt of the sacrifice to keep the cost of living low? It has been urged that yellow clarified sugar, which is produced so largely in Louisiana, and which, of old, was in such high favor everywhere, be given the same chance as granulated sugars. It is claimed that it has been largely drawn from the breakfast table by the refineries through the special inducements offered by them to dealers. The Louisiana planters have come to the relief of the people of the East, who are suffering so severely from the sugar famine that prevails in that section; and are entitled to consideration. The present situation offers an excellent opportunity to introduce Louisiana sugar to the country; to make known what is being done here and in this product, what can be done towards freeing this country from dependence on foreign-grown sugar by producing at home a large proportion of this necessity.

FARMERS AND STOCKMEN SHOULD NOT DISPOSE OF THEIR FEMALE ANIMALS.

The prices obtainable for cattle and hogs at the present time offer a strong inducement to sell, even the female stock, which is difficult to overcome. And yet, if owners will give a little thought to the future, their better judgment will certainly suggest the retention of a sufficient number of the younger female animals, especially, to maintain the supply and meet the demand for next year at least, if not for longer, which will undoubtedly be great owing to war conditions.

It is a fact that, while many cattle have recently been brought into Louisiana from the drought-stricken sections of Texas, great numbers of both cattle and hogs are being disposed of, irrespective of sex, due no doubt to the profitable prices that at present can be had for them. There is an old saying that "Money counts." But how long is it going to "count" if our stockmen dispose of their female foundations, and afterwards find out, when too late, that they have deprived themselves of the necessary females to breed from, and are short of stock to sell another year when prices will be just as high, if not higher?

If this practice is persisted in it is going to result in a shortage of meat animals when they may be needed even more than at the present time. In other words, it is not going to conserve the meat supply for ourselves and our allies, nor is it going to be the most profitable to stock owners themselves.

It may be quite permissible to get rid of a reasonable number of the old and unprofitable female stuff, but there should be a rigid line drawn at the younger female stock, if we hope to maintain and increase the supply, and meet the future demands for meat animals, which is not only a common sense proposition, but a profitable one, and a patriotic duty demanded of our people in the present world crisis in which our country is a participant.—By Dr. Dalrymple.

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

I, A. A. Theriot, President of the Parish of Iberia acting as the governing authority of Road District No. 7 of the Parish of Iberia in compliance with an ordinance passed by the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia on Friday the 19th day of October, 1917, do hereby call a special election in Road District No. 7 of the Parish of Iberia for the purpose of taking the sense of the property taxpayers duly qualified to vote as to whether or not they will vote to authorize the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia as the governing authority of said Road District No. 7 to incur an indebtedness and issue bonds to the amount of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars, \$75,000.00, the said bonds to bear interest at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, said bonds to run for a period of not longer than thirty-five years as the Police Jury may determine and the Police Jury as the governing authority of Road District No. 7 binds itself to levy each year a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest on these bonds. The proceeds of sale of said bonds to be used for the construction, improvement and maintenance of public roads and highways in Road District No. 7 of the Parish of Iberia.

The election will be held on Tuesday the 4th day of December 1917 between the hours of seven o'clock A. M. and five o'clock P. M. and the following usual polling places are hereby designated as the polling places where said election shall be held in the territory herein affected and where ballots will be received at said election, and the following persons are hereby instructed and empowered to act at the said election, to-wit: At Delcambre Hall in the Seventh Ward of the Parish of Iberia: at Derouen Post-office.
