INVESTMENT IN LIVES.

On October 3rd, the President of the Young Women's Christian Association sent out to the Women's War Work Council the following telegram:

"Increased immediate needs for women and girls in war zones in America and Europe call for much larger expenditure by Association War Council. National Board votes today to increase fund to three and a half million dollars. This action recommended by War Council Executive, October 9th. We count your understanding of this need and ask your co-operation in securing Dr. Acet. Will send headquarters and statistics following meeting of New Orleans Council."

Following is the budget adopted by the War Work Council given item by item, and estimated to cover expenditures of the National Board of the Y. W. C. A. to June 30, 1918.


