Messrs. A. C. Duboin and Hardy Bontte, members of the Board of Commissioners of the Bayou Carlin Drainage District of this Parish have been re-appointed to serve another term by Governor Pleasant. Both of their terms of office having expired.

On Thursday evening at 5:30 o'clock the home of Mr. Albert H. Trotter situated on Duperier Avenue was totally destroyed by fire. From what we have been able to learn the fire was caused by a defective flue and before help could arrive to checkmate the flames, the home was totally destroyed. Fortunately for Mr. Trotter a great portion of his furniture was saved from the ruins though it was badly damaged during the excitement. He carried some insurance on the building, but not one cent on its contents.

On Monday last the Local Exemption Board forwarded to Lafayette for final examination some fifty white citizens of this Parish and some sixty negroes. These conscripts were examined by the Appeal Board and those that were not rejected for physical deficiencies will continue to await orders to report at the cantonments. It has not yet been fully decided just what date the call will be made, prevailing opinion being however that it will be some sixty days yet.

A sad and deplorable death was that of last Sunday, March 3d which took from this community Mr. Ernest J. Berard Jr., aged 48 years and 8 months, after an illness of about two weeks. Mr. Berard had been employed baling hay in one of the adjoining parishes, and caught cold from which pneumonia set in and despite all that medical science could do, passed to the Great Beyond. Deceased leaves a family of seven children besides his devoted wife, and aged mother and father to mourn his sad demise. His second son, Thomas Berard is now serving in the Army in France, having left with what is known as the Rainbow Division some eight months ago. The funeral occurred from St. Peter's Catholic church in this City on Monday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock.

Mr. Frank Sancho of New Orleans, who through Mr. J. Fay Breaux has been contracting with our farmers to raise cucumbers for his factory at New Orleans on a wholesale scale arrived here on Wednesday. Mr. Sancho's visit here was to erect forty or more large tanks or receptacles. Each tank will have capacity of 800 bushels. It was our pleasure to interview the gentleman on Thursday and he stated most positively that the members of his firm had made up their minds to establish a canning factory here next year. With but few exceptions, the farmers within a radius of six miles have all expressed their willingness to raise every vegetable desired, if these gentlemen build a factory in New Iberia. A canning factory in our City would undoubtedly be a big success from the start, and it behooves our citizens, especially our small farmers, to show their appreciation by raising the truck desired by the representatives of the Sancho Company. With but few exceptions canning factories

in the South have not only been profitable ventures for the owners, but the greatest good is to the community who take advantage of the opportunity at their doors to raise the stuff and get good prices for their products. It means, in the first place steady and profitable employment for many who oftentimes have but little to do at certain seasons of the year, and the section in close proximity to a canning factory is always prosperous as a consequence. Then there is an immediate demand for unused land and thousands of dollars are obtained from soil that formerly was permitted to grow into weeds because there was no demand for the products. It looks like the opportunity is now here and we trust every owner of land in the vicinity of New Iberia will grasp the opportunity at once and sign the contracts, so as to insure at all seasons, a demand for truck that heretofore, in many instances, was a dearth on the market.

On Wednesday afternoon a case of much importance to the City Court was that of the City versus the Southwestern Traction and Power Company. The charge was preferred against the manager, Mr. A. H. Smith, for operating the Trolley car without dimmers and it was made by Mr. John A. Buquor. It seems that on Friday night Mrs. Buquor together with a number of lady friends were coming to New Iberia from Jeanerette in an automobile and when reaching the Gagan property at the edge of the corporate limits, the Trolley car drove into sight with a blinding headlight. Not being able to see where she was going, the lady ran her car into the ditch, breaking the machine and shaking up the occupants to such an extent that some of them required the attention of a physician. When the case was argued, some witnesses testified that there was no dimmers on at the time the accident occurred, while Mr. Smith testified that the dimmers were on. At the conclusion of the case, the Court imposed a fine of five dollars upon the manager of the Trolley and stated that the City Ordinance required that dimmers be on whenever they reached the corporate limits. It was brought out in the Court that all automobiles without dimmers were also violating the law, and steps will be taken to run down the owners of every machine who have not complied with the ordinance to the satisfaction of the Court.

DEATH OF NUMA BROUSSARD
