New Iberia, March 7th, 1918.

We are badly in need of funds and these donations have helped us at the right time.

"Much of the mail intended for the Bureau of Womans Work is delayed by reason of its being sent by Chapters to the wrong Bureau at Division Headquarters. In order to expediate matters relating to this Bureau the attention of those in charge of that branch of the work in Chapters is specially called to the following:

To the Bureau of Womans Work of each Division, National Headquarters has assigned the supervision of the production and inspection of all finished articles produced by Chapters for use in Red Cross work. This includes all knitted articles, hospital garments, and surgical dressings, refugee clothing, comfort kits, Christmas packets, gun wipes and other articles produced by the

workers of Chapters, and the supervision of work rooms, and appointment of instructors. All questions relating in any way to the production of these articles, or instructions thereto, or to patterns therefor, should be submitted to this Bureau and full information will be furnished by us on any of these subjects.

Correspondence on these subjects should be carried on by the Chairman of Woman's Work in each Chapter, directly with this Bureau. All branches or auxiliaries of a Chapter must write to their Chapter for information and not to the Division offices.

The Chairman of Woman's work in each Chapter will give out all official instructions and information to work rooms, branches and auxiliaries, and thus avoid confusion that might be caused by instructions going to branches and auxiliaries from different sources.

The Chairman of Woman's work in each Chapter will receive all information instructions and standards from this Bureau, in regard to knitted articles, hospital garments, linen and supplies, surgical dressings, refugee clothing, comfort kits and anything else produced for the Red Cross. All questions about organization, equipment and management of work rooms, daily and weekly reports therein, uniforms to be worn, quality of material to be used, inspection, wrapping, and packing finished articles will be answered by this Bureau."

This is from a letter that will be read fully in the work rooms on Thursday and Friday of this week as it is too lengthy to publish as a whole and the balance is only of interest to the working members. It is signed by Mrs. Katherine Mobley, Gulf Division Director of Woman's Bureau.

### CHARTER

OF THE  
St. Matthew Benevolent Association.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of Iberia.

Be it known that on this 6th day of March A. D., 1918, before me, Chas. L. Provost, a duly commissioned and qualified Notary Public in and for the Parish and State aforesaid and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned,

Personally came and appeared the parties whose names are unto subscribed, all residents of the said Parish and State, who declared unto me Notary, that, desiring to avail themselves of the provisions of the laws of the State of Louisiana, relative to the formation of corporations for Religious, Literary, Scientific, Charitable and Benevolent purposes, and as such, to acquire and enjoy the rights, privileges and powers of a body corporate in law, they do hereby form themselves into a corporation and body politic, under the name and style and for the purposes hereinafter specially set forth, to-wit:

### Article I.

The name and title of this corporation and association shall be the Saint Matthew Benevolent Association.

### Article II.

The objects and purposes of this Association shall be the cultivation of the moral, intellectual and social life of its members, and to assist them in sickness and distress and to bury its dead, to raise money by the payment of monthly dues, assessments, taxation consistent with and in order to execute the objects and purposes of existence.

### Article III.

The domicile of this Association shall be at New Iberia, Parish of Iberia, State of Louisiana, and all citations or legal process shall be served upon the President of this Association, and in his absence upon the Vice President, and in the absence of both the President and Vice President, upon the Secretary.

### Article IV.

This Corporation and Association shall exist and continue for a period of ninety-nine years, unless sooner dissolved by a vote of two-thirds of the entire membership.

Under its corporate style it shall

have the power to contract, sue and be sued, to use, possess and own real estate and personal property of any kind, the same to convey, sell, transfer, assign, setover and deliver; to receive and accept or to refuse legacies, successions and inheritances, to build, repair, increase and improve said property, to lease, hire, exchange, mortgage, alienate and sell to the best advantage and to execute every act of law which may concern this organization. To make, establish, change, repeal or modify such by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management, regulation and realization of the objects and purposes of this Association as herein set forth.

### Article V.

The officers of this Corporation and Association shall be a President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Financial Secretary, Treasurer, Marshal and Assistant Marshal who shall be elected annually on the 3rd Sunday of January in each year, and who shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified.

The President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Financial Secretary, Treasurer, Marshal and Assistant Marshal, shall constitute the Board of Directors of this Corporation and Association, and the majority of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The affairs of this Association shall be administered by the said Board of Directors, who shall have the power and authority which usually belongs to their respective positions.

Until the election above provided for, Samuel Bowles shall be the President of this Corporation and Association; William Taylor shall be Vice President; James J. Perry shall be Financial Secretary; Mrs. Elodie Segura shall be Recording Secretary; Mary A. Reed shall be Treasurer; Henry Reed shall be Marshal and Mrs. Lucy Phillip shall be Assistant Marshal and they shall constitute the Board of Directors of this Association and Corporation as above provided.

### Article VI.

Any vacancies occurring among the Trustee of Officers of this Association, by death, resignation or otherwise, shall be filled for the remainder of the year, by a majority vote of the members present

at any regular meeting.

### Article VII.

No member shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or faults of this Association in any further sum than the indebtedness of said member to this Association.

Nor shall any informality in this Association, have the effect of annulling the same or rendering any member liable beyond the amount above set forth.

### Article VIII.

Four members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

This Association shall cease to exist by the consent of two-thirds of the members present at a meeting called for that purpose and notice of same having been given at least thirty days previous, at a regular meeting of this Association.

Thus done, passed and signed at my office in the City of New Iberia, State of Louisiana, on the day, month and year first above written, in the presence of Messrs. E. E. Delhommer and Marc Derouen, good and competent witnesses of lawful age, residing in the Parish, who with the parties hereto have signed these presents before me, the undersigned Notary after due reading of the whole.
