The above motion having been put to a vote which was unanimous, the above motion is declared carried.

There being no further business for this session, on motion of Mr. Gary, seconded by Mr. Decuir and carried the Board of Review of the Parish of Iberia, La., adjourned to convene again May 17th, 1918.

Mr. E. Vuillemot, District Attorney, being present, the books of the several vat inspectors were submitted to him for investigation.

The investigation of these books disclosed the fact that a number of cattle owners were disregarding the meaning of the law and failed to dip regularly every fourteen days as the law demand. The names of the delinquents were handed to the proper authority for prosecution.

The investigation further disclosed the fact that it is necessary that the cattle owners notify the vat inspector of their respective dipping place whenever a transfer of cattle from one vat to another takes place or in the case of sale or whenever cattle are moved from vat to vat for any reason whatsoever. The District Attorney instructed the vat inspectors accordingly.

The investigation further shows that the books are kept in a satisfactory manner with the exception of one book where records were missing. Proper steps will be taken in order that records be kept in an efficient manner. The purpose of the meeting having been fulfilled on motion of Mr. Decuir, seconded by Mr. Romero and carried the members of the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia adjourned.

Any Suburban lot shall be valued at \$100.00 per acre with an assessed valuation of \$50.00 per acre as heretofore. Valuation on town property will be placed by the Board of Review at a future date.
