obligating themselves to assist the
government. Remember these

give their time and assistance, as
well as their own subscription to
the great cause undertaken by
this government, and they should
be met in the proper spirit and a
quick response, so as to wind up
the campaign on June 28th if pos-
sible and "go over the top."

ent at an important meeting to be
held at the Iberia Parish Court
House, New Iberia, La., Sunday,
June 23, 1918 at 9:30 A. M.

Grand Republic and for our boys
over there please do not fail to
attend this meeting."

**LOREAUVILLE YOUTH DIED
FROM FATAL INJURIES.**

On Monday morning Mr. Simon
Oubre, the young son of Mr. Oc-
tave Oubre of Loreauville died at
a Sanitarium in New Orleans
from injuries received near Jean-
erette on the night of June 14th.
Young Oubre with Mr. Tony
Broussard, Miss Antoinette Brou-
ssard and another young lady were
returning from Charenton during
the late hours of the night and
when making one of those dan-
gerous curves, a few miles below
Jeanerette, the Dodge car that
they were in turned turtle and
fell over on the occupants. Mr.
Oubre's spinal chord was broken,
while the other parties met
only with slight bruises. The
unfortunate boy was immediately
put aboard a Southern Pacific
train and escorted to New Or-
leans and while there succumbed.
The remains were then shipped
back to New Iberia and after-
wards taken to his home at Lo-
reauville from which place he was
buried on Tuesday evening. The
sad affair cast a gloom over the
community. His grief-stricken
family have the heartfelt sympathy
of numerous friends.

As we have nothing to report
in the way of work, our rooms
being closed, by order of the Gulf
Division, we think it would not
be amiss to say a few words about
the decentralization of our work,
and give the names of the officers
of the Chapter, as it is so long
since anything has been said about
them we have been asked several
times who they are: Chairman,
Mrs. C. W. Outhwaite; Vice Chair-
man, Mrs. W. G. Weeks; Secre-
tary, Mrs. Louise Hine; Treas-
urer, Mr. Scranton Rand; Board
of Directors, Chairman Mr. E. L.
Estorge; Messrs. E. T. Weeks, L.
A. Walet, Alfred Renouet,
Scranton Rand, Mmes. Louise
Hine and C. W. Outhwaite.

Before we begin work we will
endeavor to run the department
of Woman's Work as outlined by
the Gulf Division and hope to
have all appointments ready for
the different position in time for
the Board of Directors to approve
them by next week.

We wish to say to the various
women who will be selected, that
unless they have some real good
reason, we ask them not to re-
fuse, for this work is getting so
big that the few who have held
it up, must have help, or we are
not doing our duty by the men
who are leaving us in comfort and
peace on this side.

Of course, we understand, that
some of us will always have more
time than others to give to war
work, but all can do something.
This week we are giving the
duties of three of the committees

and next week will complete the
list with the names of each com-
mittee, after approval of the
Board of Directors.

**Personnel of Woman's Work in
Iberia Chapter.**

Chairman of Woman's work ap-
pointed by the Executive Com-
mittee.

Duties of this position. To
have charge of the organization
and general supervision of the de-
partment of woman's work and
work rooms in the Chapter, its
branches and auxiliaries. Au-
thority to decide any question that
may arise therein. To appoint
with the approval of the Execu-
tive Committee.

Head Instructress in the Teach-
ing Center.

Chairman of Supplies in wo-
man's work.

Supervisors or Captains of
Surgical Dressings in the differ-
ent work rooms.

Supervisor or Captain of
Knitting.

Supervisor of Refugee Cloth-
ing.

To give out all official instru-
ctions and information to Chapter
work rooms, branches and auxilia-
ries.

To keep records of all finished
articles completed in Chapter
work rooms, branches or auxilia-
ries, and report same weekly to
Division Director of Woman's
work, or as may be required.

All shipment of finished arti-
cles made to Division Warehouse.
To open and provide for the
proper distribution of all mail di-
rected to her office.

Classes for instruction in Surgi-
cal Dressings should register with
the Chairman of Woman's work,
or at her request, with the Head
Instructor of the teaching center.

The Chairman of Woman's
work is responsible to Divisional
Headquarters for all work sent in
from the Chapter, its branches
and auxiliaries or work rooms.

The Chairman of Woman's
work need not necessarily have
taken the course in surgical dress-
ings, but it is better that she
should do so.

Head Instructor in the Teach-
ing Center.

To instruct pupils in surgical
dressings.

To see that supplies are on
hand for her classes.

To decide any technical question
that may arise in the surgical
dressing department.

If permitted by the Chairman of
Woman's work, she may pack arti-
cles made by her classes and send
them to the Chapter headquar-
ters. Otherwise she will turn
them in as part of general work-
room work.

Chairman of Supplies in Wo-
man's work.

To ascertain from the Execu-
tive Committee the amount of
money allotted the woman's de-
partment from time to time.

To purchase all supplies needed,
after conferring with the Chair-
man of Woman's Work.

To keep an account of all sup-
plies received and disbursed.

To approve all bills made in this
department.

The Chairman of Supplies
should consult freely with the
Chairman of Woman's work in
regard to quantity and kind of
supplies needed.

There shall be for the present
the following work rooms:

- No. 1. Headquarters.
- No. 2. Avery.
- No. 3. Roman Catholic Con-
vent.
- No. 4. Mellhenny.
- No. 5. Loreauville.
- No. 6. Lake or Mrs. Harrison.
- No. 7. Mrs. Pharr in the form-
er Parsonage.

These rooms will be presided
over by different ladies whose
duties will be published next
week, as taken from the regula-
tions sent us to govern Woman's
work in the Chapters in the Gulf
Division.

With seven work rooms we
should when work is started send

out as much work as any Chapter
in the Gulf Division.

We have not yet received our
quota for work nor the kind we
will be given to do. We trust
whatever it is the members will
readily respond, and all work, to
get it out in the time given us,
to make it up in.

There will be a meeting of all
members who are willing to as-
sist with light refreshments for
the benefit of the Chapter on
Wednesday morning at 10:00, at
Masonic building, June 26th.
