We found the mill in full operation and shipments of new rice had already been made to Lafayette. Mr. Conrad has always been the first rice planter to get his cereal on the market and living up to these practices, he started his mill last week. The wholesalers in New Iberia have also been supplied with several hundred pockets. This mill's output has been doubled this year and its capacity is now six hundred barrels per day. Every piece of machinery in this Plant was set up and adjusted by Mr. Conrad who is of mechanical mind, and we dare say, it could not be improved upon. The buildings are roomy and well proportioned and ere long he intends to make several more additions. Besides being a miller Mr. Conrad is one of the largest and most successful rice planters in the State and his interests here together with the mill helps materially in giving New Iberia prominence.

Several times within the past few years efforts have been made to rid the Parish of unscrupulous negro "hoodoo" doctors, and those who practice upon the ignorant negroes and we are sorry to say some white people who know no better also let themselves be mulcted by these people.

Last April a case of this kind came to light after a negro boy about twenty years old had lost his life. The boy who was known as Eli Simon lived on the Bussey Plantation near Jeanerette and had been treated by a registered physician. Not recovering quite as rapidly as members of his family thought he ought to, though he was walking around the house, the father hearing of a negro woman by the name of Bazilie Copes that resides on the hill above New Iberia working wonders with her ingredients called at her home and interviewed her. She said it was necessary that he put up 50c and she would "cut the cards" before she could prescribe. The negro gave her the money and the "cards were cut" and the supposed cure handed over with the payment of \$1.00 on the medicine which was valued at \$5.00. Directions were given to the father and he went home and had the boy to first rub his neck and chest and then administered a large dose internally. Within a few minutes thereafter he died. After his death the parents went to their regular physician and told him what happened. This led to an examination and it was found that Bazilie Copes had stepped in between the physician and administered concoctions that brought on death. Charges were made against the woman for practicing medicine without a license and she was found guilty in the City Court and a fine of \$50.00 imposed. The woman took an appeal to the District Court and Judge Simon affirmed the decision of Judge Power, adding the costs of the higher Court to the penalty. Judge Simon read her a lecture and warned her if she ever appeared before the Court again on such a charge he would confine her to the penitentiary for the remainder of her life. This should be a warning to the negroes not to be humbugged by these hoodoo doctors. We have heard of instances in this Parish where white people of the ignorant class permit this class of fakirs to administer medicine to them and oftentimes they pay fabulous prices for the treatment.
