

# Proceedings of the Police Jury.

New Iberia, La., Dec. 14, '18.  
Pursuant to adjournment dated December 5th, 1918, the members of the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia, La., met this day in regular session with the following members present to-wit: Messrs. H. Romero, Adrien Gonsoulin, II, Derouen, F. Dietlein, V. J. Erath and Numa Miguez. Absent: Messrs. E. J. Gary, Louis Deeur, A. A. Theriot, Dr. A. C. McGowen and A. P. Moresi.

Due to the absence of Mr. A. A. Theriot, Mr. Dietlein presided. On motion of Mr. Gonsoulin, seconded by Mr. Derouen and carried the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with.

In response to solicitation by the Police Jury for sealed bids from banking institutions to act in the capacity of Fiscal Agent for the Parish of Iberia during the year 1919, as per advertisement in the Official Journal the following sealed were opened and submitted to-wit:

New Iberia, La., Dec. 3d, 1918. To the President and members of the Police Jury of Iberia Parish, La.:

The Bank of Loreauville, Loreauville, La., having submitted the highest bid for the Fiscal Agency of the Parish of Iberia for the year 1919, on motion of Mr. Adrien Gonsoulin, seconded by Mr. Derouen and unanimously carried the Bank of Loreauville is hereby declared to be the Fiscal Agency of the Parish of Iberia, La., for the year 1919.

The adoption of a license ordinance for the year 1919, the following ordinance was presented and adopted as follows:

### License Ordinance.

An Ordinance by the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia, La., to levy, collect and enforce payment of an annual license tax upon all persons or persons, business firms or corporation pursuing any trade, vocation, calling or business within the limits of the Parish of Iberia, La., and without the Corporate Limits of the Town of New Iberia, Jeanerette, Delcambre and Loreauville.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia that there is hereby levied an annual license for the year 1919 upon each person or persons, association of persons, business firm or corporation pursuing any trade, vocation calling or business subject to license within the limits of Iberia Parish and without the Corporate limits of the Town of New Iberia, Jeanerette, Delcambre and Loreauville.

Sec. 2. Be it ordained that on the day following the fourth publication of this ordinance, the Tax Collector of the Parish of Iberia shall begin to collect and shall collect as fast as possible from each of those enumerated below a license tax as herein after graduated.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained that all licenses shall be due and collected during the first two months of the year 1919 and all unpaid licenses shall become delinquent on the 1st day of March, 1919 and all firms who commence business after this date shall pay their licenses within ten days following the opening of their business.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia, that for any barroom, cabaret, cafe house, cafe, grog shop, beer garden or any other place where distilled, alcoholic, vinous, malt or any other kind of liquor is sold, within the Parish of Iberia and outside of the Corporate limits of the town of New Iberia, Jeanerette, Delcambre and Loreauville, the annual license shall be Five Hundred Dollars, (\$500.00).

The votes on Sec. 4 of this ordinance resulted as follows:  
In favor of \$500.00, unanimous.  
Against, none.

And the license is hereby declared to be \$500.00.

Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, etc. that any person or persons operating a public dance hall, ball room or any other place of amusement where an entrance fee is charged, either directly or indirectly, or where refreshments are sold, shall pay an annual license of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars.

Sec. 6. And that for any circus or traveling show of any kind, the annual license shall be:  
(a) When employing 100 persons or more, One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars;  
(b) When employing less than 100 persons, Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars.

Sec. 7. And that for the conduct of any retail mercantile business by any one, either as principal or agent, the annual license shall be:  
(a) When the annual gross sales are \$25,000 or more, Twenty Five Dollars.  
(b) When the gross sales are \$20,000 or less than \$25,000, Twenty Dollars, (\$20.00).  
(c) When the gross sales are \$25,000 or less than \$20,000, Fifteen Dollars.  
(d) When the gross sales are \$5,000.00 or less than \$15,000, Ten Dollars.  
(e) When the gross sales are \$5,000 or less, Five Dollars.

Sec. 8. Be it further ordained, etc. that each peddler or hawk shall pay a license for the year 1919 as follows:  
(a) When traveling in any boat or water craft the license shall be Two Hundred and Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars.  
(b) When traveling in an automobile or any other self propelling vehicle, the license shall be Two Hundred and Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars.  
(c) When traveling in a two horse vehicle the license shall be One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).  
(d) When traveling in a one horse vehicle the license shall be Seventy Five Dollars (\$75.00).  
(e) When traveling on horse back the license shall be Sixty Dollars (\$60.00).  
(f) When traveling on foot, Fifty Dollars, (\$50.00).

Sec. 9. Be it further ordained that for every automobile, auto truck, motor cycle or any other self propelling vehicle kept within the Parish of Iberia and without the Corporate limits of the Town of New Iberia, Jeanerette, Delcambre and Loreauville, an annual license is hereby levied as follows:  
(a) When with a seating capacity of 7 or more, Seven Dollars (\$7.00).

(b) When with a seating capacity of 5 or less than 7, Five Dollars, (\$5.00).  
(c) When the seating capacity is 2 or less than 5, Three Dollars, (\$3.00).  
(d) For motor truck or freight carrying automobile, Five Dollars, (\$5.00).  
(e) For motor cycle, Two Dollars, (\$2.00).

Sec. 10. Be it further ordained that the following trades are subject to an annual license of Five Dollars (\$5.00) to-wit: Doctors and Transient Photographers.

The above ordinance presented by Mr. Derouen, on motion of Mr. Erath, duly seconded by Mr. Gonsoulin was adopted by the following votes, to-wit:

# RED CROSS ROLL CALL FOR CHRISTMAS WEEK

American Public Asked to Respond With Universal Membership.

Is your name written there? Where? On the Red Cross Christmas Roll Call, of course.

Beginning with Red Cross Sunday, December 15, the entire American nation will be given the opportunity during the week of December 16 to 23 to line up for all those errands of mercy that the bright Red Cross against the white background has come to symbolize.

This is in no sense a call for funds. It is the annual call for service. Every member of every household, from the grandfather to the nursery, should be represented on the Red Cross Service Flag. Only dollar memberships are being asked for, and these are for the calendar year of 1919.

Everywhere throughout the fourteen Red Cross divisions the week will be celebrated as a rededication to personal service and self sacrifice. No matter what may be the immediate task ahead, there are bound to be increasing demands made on the Red Cross during the coming year, and every American, whether here or in foreign parts, has his part to play.

Through the Divisions every Chapter, and through the Chapter every Branch and Auxiliary will spread the Red Cross Message and endeavor to enroll every person in every community. Already the membership in this national organization has grown from some few hundred thousand in 1916 to more than twenty millions since our own country entered the world war. There are no limits set for the 1918 Christmas enrollment. Every American everywhere is the hoped for goal.

Programs subject to local conditions will be arranged for the week, based on suggestions worked out by national campaign managers at Headquarters. On Roll Call Sunday the Red Cross message will be preached from every pulpit, and all church meetings will arrange special programs of Red Cross activities.

With the co-operation of local artists, every community will be decorated with Red Cross posters. Posters will be used on all packages sent out from the stores during Roll Call week, and the movies will show films picturing the various Red Cross agencies at home and abroad. "For All Humanity" shows scenes taken on the actual battlefield. There will also be Women's day, club programs on Red Cross, special exercises in the Red

Cross workrooms, Employees day (when special tribute will be paid to the contribution made by the laboring man), the week ending with a general "Clean-up" day, when every person in the community not yet enrolled will again be personally solicited for membership.

It is believed that some time during the week at least one performance of the masque, "The Roll Call," especially written by Mr. Percy Mackaye, with stage settings designed by Robert Edmond Jones, will be given in every community. This has but twelve speaking parts and is arranged especially for community presentation, with men, women and children in the pantomime parts. It can be given either elaborately or very simply, as conditions warrant. In its dramatic theme it expresses the emancipation of the human spirit from tyranny through the humanizing agency of the American Red Cross. Copies of the masque, as well as directions for costuming and incidental music, can be secured at Red Cross Headquarters in every town and city.

One of the most novel and interesting features of the campaign promises to be the One-day and One-Hour plan of enrollment. This consists of dividing the community into units of one hundred houses, the idea being to have sufficient workers to canvass these homes practically simultaneously, a sort of "home stretch," distributing the work among many with a minimum of time consumed by each.

The official uniform worn by Roll Call workers will be a cap and arm brassard. These are to be made of red flannel and a small paper circle in white will carry the Red Cross emblem. This uniform will serve both as protection against the unscrupulous and as an aid to the workers themselves.

Corporations, business firms and industries will be supplied with a 100% Service flag.

There will be no Christmas sale of tuberculosis seals this year. Instead, the Red Cross has made a direct appropriation of \$2,500,000 for this work, and ten seals will be awarded each person who joins the Roll Call as a reminder of the very important work being done by the National Tuberculosis Association.

Wars may come and wars may go, but the Red Cross goes on forever.

Resolution of the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia, Louisiana, auditing the claim of Austin Bond Company, contractor, in the sum of Seventy Thousand Dollars, (\$70,000.00) and ordering the execution and delivery to them of Seventy Thousand Dollars (70,000) Iberia Parish certificates of payment in full settlement thereof.

Whereas, Austin Bond Company, Contractor has presented and filed their claim amounting to Seventy Thousand Dollars, (\$70,000) for material furnished and work done, pursuant to a contract entered into between the Parish of Iberia, Louisiana, and said Contractor, for the construction and operation of dipping vats and cost of dipping materials, and for labor and materials furnished in maintaining and constructing roads, bridges and highways, and for said Parish, which claim is hereby made a part hereof as though set forth in full, and

Whereas, the Police Jury of said Parish having investigated the work and material authorized under said contract, and being satisfied that said work and material were furnished in accordance with said contract; thereupon said Police Jury proceeded to examine and audit the said claim this day filed and finding that same was duly authorized and certified to, and that said amount is due as represented by said claim and is in full satisfaction of said contract, which contract is dated November 7, 1918.

It is therefore ordered by the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia, Louisiana:

That said claim be received, approved and allowed in full and it is further ordered and directed that said claim shall be paid in the following manner:

The Police Jury shall cause to be executed and delivered to said Austin Bond Company, Certificates of Payment in the sum of Seventy Thousand (\$70,000.00) Dollars, being in the denominations of \$1,000 each, numbered from 1 to 70, inclusive, bearing interest at five per cent per annum; payable semi-annually to
