On the Monday following, a letter from Mr. Canton O'Brien was received by his parents telling them that he had been in several engagements with other boys from this Parish, and stated that young Delahoussaye was confined in a hospital from slight wounds received before the armistice was signed. The message was phoned to Mr. and Mrs. Delahoussaye by Mrs. O'Brien and it can be imagined how relieved they were over the good news that their son was alive and only slightly wounded. Mr. O'Brien mentioned the name of Porteus Camos of Loreauville being slightly wounded with others in his regiment.
