

**MILITARY PARTY BITTERLY
RESENTS ARMISTICE
TERMS.**

London, Feb. 18.—Advices received from Berlin by way of Basel today are to the effect that the pan-German military party, headed by Field Marshal von Hindenburg, bitterly resents the new clauses in the armistice, especially those limiting the German army to the size of a simple police force, the supervision of control of ammunition factories and the demand that Germany pay the expenses of the Allied armies of occupation on the Rhine.

The conditions, it is complained, will throw out of work thousands of German officers, from generals downward, while the army of six hundred thousand volunteers reported by the German press to have been organized must be disbanded.

The advices and that indignation against Mathias Erzberger on the part of the military authorities has increased.

Would Cause Moral Collapse.

Berlin, Feb. 18.—The German government's reasons for accepting the stringent terms for the renewal of the armistice, as outlined in a Weimar dispatch to the Nord Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, is that a renewal of military operations following refusal to sign would lead to the complete moral collapse of the German people. The absolute conviction prevailed that refusal to sign, or dilatory treatment of the proposals, would meet with an immediate advance of the Allied armies beyond the Rhine, involving the occupation of the most important and indispensable industrial districts of West Germany.

imously that the people as a whole would neither understand nor approve such an outcome, and that therefore, there was no alternative except to sign under protest.

The Berlin papers generally come to the same conclusion, except the conservative organs, such as the Krtuz Zeitung, and the Allgemeine Zeitung, which declares that the government should have refused to sign the terms, thus forcing the Allies to take the responsibility for a renewal of military operations.

Italy Declines Proposal.

Paris, Feb. 18.—The Italian delegation to the peace conference, according to an official note, has informed the secretary of the conference that it cannot accept the proposal for the arbitration of Italian and Yugoslav claims in Dalmatia as urged by the Yugoslavs.

The Italian plenipotentiaries explain that all territorial claims are being submitted to the peace conference and they do not believe that recourse should be had to any exceptional procedure.

Early last week the Yugoslav delegates to the peace conference asked President Wilson to act as arbitrator in the differences with Italy regarding the eastern coast of the Adriatic. President Wilson suggested that the Italians and Yugoslavs discuss their differences. The Italians declined to make a decision at that time. Later the Yugoslav delegates appealed to Premier Clemenceau as president of the conference to act as arbitrator, but there have been no reports that the French leaders took any action on the question.

TIMELY NOTES FOR THE HOME GARDEN.

The proper watering of young plants in the hotbed has much to do with their general health and progress. To control the supply of water it is necessary to provide against entrance of rain and excessive amounts of soil moisture.

Where the soil is water-logged the frame should be placed on the surface and an earth layer banked up around it. Then, of course, the top should be made so that it will shed water. The soil layer should be of a type that drains well. The addition of sand to this layer makes it looser, causing it to dry out faster, and this, together with surface cultivation, will minimize the danger of damp-off disease. (Remember that seed should never be sown broadcast, or it will be impossible to stir the soil around the plants.)

Plants while kept under cover should be watered moderately—even sparingly—and none at all during cloudy or rainy weather or when the air is growing colder. If this practice is adhered to and the surface soil between the rows kept loose, so that it will dry quickly, one should, with the other conditions that spacing gives—namely, sunlight, fresh air, etc.—be able to grow plants that will yield their maximum of fruit.—Norma Overbey, garden specialist, Extension Division, Louisiana State University.

FLU COST 1,060 LIVES IN DIVISION CAMPS.

One thousand sixty soldiers died and 23,162 were stricken with influenza during the first epidemic in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama and the death rate was 4.43 per cent, it is shown in a tabulated report of the Department of Military Relief, Gulf Division, American Red Cross.

**VARDAMAN OPENS DEBATE
AGAINST NATIONS
LEAGUE.**

Washington, Feb. 18.—Opposition in the Senate to the constitution of a League of Nations began today to take definite form. Senator Borah of Idaho, a Republican member of the foreign relations committee, formally declined to accept President Wilson's invitation to attend the White House dinner February 26, and Senator Poin Dexter of Washington, Republican, announced he would speak in the Senate tomorrow in criticism of the league plan. All members of the Senate foreign relations committee except Mr. Borah plan to attend the President's dinner to discuss with him the constitution of the league and it was expected that they would abide by the President's request to refrain from opening discussion of the matter until that time. General debate in the Senate, however, may follow Senator Poin Dexter's address.

Open criticism of the league constitution was voiced today in the Senate by Senator Vardaman of Mississippi, Democrat. He said it was unconstitutional and also criticized President Wilson for requesting that discussion in Congress be postponed until after the conference with the Senate and House foreign relations committees.

Senator Borah plans to speak Thursday in opposition to the league. In his letter to Secretary Tumulty declining the President's invitation, Mr. Borah said it was the custom to hold in confidence any information received at conferences at the White House and that he was not willing to be bound to silence on such an important subject, on which he and the President disagreed, fundamentally.

After receiving the letter, which Senator Borah made public today, Secretary Tumulty immediately transmitted it by radio to President Wilson on the steamer George Washington, which is due to reach Boston next Tuesday.

It was regarded tonight as highly probable attacks on the league plan in the Senate would draw spirited defense from administration senators. Some senators said they did not regard the President's request as precluding replies to criticism. Their view is that the President actually means to request postponement of judgment or conviction on the tentative constitution and not to prevent its supporters from replying to any open criticism in the Senate.

The Hospital Branch is open only for men having grammar school education.


The Firemen Branch is open only for men having physques up to regular Navy standard.


