was snapped in the face and the
upper-lip lacerated. Despite the
dog law and the measures taken
every once and a while by the off-
icers to get rid of them there is yet
many running at large around the
community. It would be well for
a general cleaning up of all stray
dogs in the near future before the
spread of rabbies which was so
common last year.

—The incessant rains of the past
two months is creating an alarm-
ing condition among the farmers
of the Parish. Notwithstanding
the fact that they are some two
months behind in their planting
operations, from the reports we
learn seed cane has not as yet
been affected from the wet weath-
er. This week we interviewed Mr.
Jules Olivier of Lydia and also
Mr. Numa Miguez of the Seventh
Ward and both of these gentle-
men stated that so far the seed
cane is still in good condition. Mr.
Olivier said he had examined seed
on several different properties in
his neighborhood and no evidence
of rot was noticeable. Of course
if we have a few more weeks of
bad weather there is no doubt
much of it will be unfit for use,
particularly that windrowed in
low lands. It is impossible now
to plow the lands and unless there
is an early cessation of wet weath-
er many of the farmers will suffer
as a consequence.

—Mr. W. L. Grant, the Deputy
Tax Collector returned here this
week and re-opened offices in the
Parish Court House. All citizens
who are subject to paying taxes
to the U. S. Government would
do well to take advantage of his
assistance in making out returns
for 1918. After March 15th all
who have failed to make out re-
ports and settled with Uncle Sam
are subject to heavy penalties.

—Messrs. F. M. Bodin, E. R. and
A. A. Theriot and J. Emile Verret
last week purchased the Alice E.
and Ivanhoe Plantations situated
in the Parish of St. Mary near
Cote Blanche Island. These plan-
tations embrace an area of some
six thousand acres of land and at
present 2000 is under cultivation.
The amount involved in the pur-
chase of these two places was
\$110,000.00. Mr. F. M. Bodin
one of our popular citizens has
agreed to manage these valuable
properties for the co-owners. He
will not give up his residence here,
however, and will spend a part
of his time looking after his in-
terests in this Parish also.

—After much annoyance and
great expense in collecting the
fees for the lights and water,
Commissioner Girard and the
Board of Trustees have at last de-
cided to adopt the plan of other
municipalities by having each
user of light and water remit di-
rect by mail or go to the office and
make settlements. Beginning on
the 1st and every month hence-
forth all invoices will be mailed
direct to each City customer and
it is expected that everybody
make settlements before the 12th
day of each month, otherwise
without any further notice the
lights and water will be cut off.
It was necessary to take these
steps because so many people
made it a practice to put the col-
lector off each month, telling them
to come back another day. Some-
times visits were made to homes as
many as seven times before an ad-
justment, thus keeping one
man steadily at his task col-
lecting. Now the same plan as
the Cumberland Telephone Co.
will be put into practice and all
are expected to remit direct to
the City Treasurer.


