—We had a pleasant call on Monday from Mr. Henry J. David the Parish Agricultural Agent of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Mr. David has removed here with his family from Lafourche parish where he had been assisting the farmers for the past four years. He is a man of wide experience in agricultural training and will do all he can to furnish our agriculturists with information regarding soil fertility, etc. that should be of incalculable benefit to them. We welcome the gentleman to our Parish and trust his services will be appreciated by our people. Mr. David speaks the French language and for that reason many of our natives who do not understand English should get in touch with him whenever they want his assistance.

—On Monday, March 31st, the young seventeen-year-old son of Mr. Walter Segura died after only a few days illness at his father's home at Segura. The funeral was conducted by Rev. Langlois of St. Peter's Catholic church on Tuesday, April 1st at 9 o'clock A. M. in the presence of sympathetic relatives and friends. Mr. and Mrs. Segura have the sincere condolences of a large circle of acquaintances throughout the Parish.

—Died, at Orange, Texas, on Thursday, April 3d, at 7 o'clock A. M., Mr. Chas. H. Dumesnil, born April 6th, 1861. Mr. Dumesnil was well known in this Parish and for many years resided near Morbihan plantation. His remains arrived here yesterday evening when it was escorted to the home of Mrs. J. M. Bourg after which the funeral services were conducted. The members of Cyprus Camp No. 34 turned out in large numbers to pay their respects to their deceased brother.

—This Parish enjoyed another good heavy rain last Thursday that is calculated to be of great benefit to the planting interests, especially the corn and rice, and in a few days all of the farmers will again be at work finishing their plowing and planting. With but few exceptions, most of the planting has already been done in many parts of the Parish. Since the introduction of tractors in this vicinity many have advanced their plowing several weeks. We learn that there are several of our more progressive farmers that have rigged up their tractors to work at night as well as in the day time. These tractors can easily be equipped with lights so that night plowing can be executed, thus enabling the farmers to accomplish double the work when the occasion warrants it. Prospects are bright for big crops this year despite the set back due to the long wet spell some weeks ago. It is regrettable that a number of the farmers lost seed cane during the unceasing rainy weather. In some instances the loss falls quite heavily on many of the farmers whose seed was under water for several weeks.

—District Deputy Jos. Davis who attended the State Convention at Alexandria last week reported it one of the most successful conventions ever held in Louisiana. The next convention will be held at Lafayette during 1920. During the fiscal year just ended some 22,871 people were initiated into the ranks of the Woodmen of the World seeking insurance and other advantages of that popular association.

—Hazing in a minor degree at the State University at Baton Rouge took place last Monday morning when thirteen freshmen were victims of the first hair clipping at the University since the 1919 term begun. Among the young Iberians who experienced the shock of the clippers was Messrs. A. J. Voorhies, Jr., P. C. Courrage, James L. Burke and W. A. Mestayer. The freshmen reported about twenty students in the hazing party all of whom wore black masks and were otherwise bedecked with sheets and gowns. Steps were taken by the faculty to circumvent acts of this nature in the future. However, the experience of the young men of this City will always be a gentle reminder for them to be on the look out in the future.

—On Wednesday evening, April 23rd, the Elks will entertain with an after Easter musical program and dance following, at the Club for members and wives with invited guests. ## ONE-TENTH FOR CHURCH WORK.

If it may be thought incredible by some that there are Christians today who are willing to lay aside one-tenth of their income and give it to the work of the church, but such is true.

Rev. H. N. Brown, pastor of the Methodist Church in New Iberia is authority for the statement that there are in the Methodist church here seven tithers. This number has been secured as a result of an intensive campaign, during which the missionary needs of the world have been set forth with earnest exhortations to Methodists that it is their duty to do their utmost to make it possible to evangelize the world.

The Methodist Church has been active in missionary work for 100 years, but, considering the size of its membership and its wealth, the heads of the denomination have

considered that thus far Methodists have been playing at missions. Now the program calls for an offering of \$115,000,000 to be given in five years, all of which will be spent in home and foreign missions. A reconstruction program will be carried out both in Europe and America. Of this amount Southern Methodists are to raise \$35,000,000.

The method of securing this amount of money is an intensive one. It has been said by Bishop Atkins, one of the leaders of the Missionary Centenary, that "When 2,000,000 Christians go from their knees to any task, it shall be done." Already Methodists all over America have made the pledge to pray earnestly for the success of this campaign. Millions of leaflets have been circulated in almost every home of the denomination, and offices are being maintained in every state and conference territory, where a force of men and women are being kept busy letting the people know why the denomination wants \$35,000,000 and what it will do with the money when it comes. It is this information that has convinced so many Methodists that the only way to do all the work the church ought to do today is for the individual to divide his money with the Lord on the Bible plan of a tithe.
