**KEEP THE GARDEN GOING ALL SUMMER.**

Gardeners should interpret literally the adage, "Don't let the grass grow under your feet," according to Miss Ola Overbey, garden specialist, Extension Division, Louisiana State University, who advises that frequent shallow cultivation be practiced for keeping down grass and weeds and also to conserve moisture for the vegetable growth.

"A mistake that many gardeners make," says Miss Overbey, is to neglect spaces where vegetables have matured and passed their stage of usefulness. Such vegeta- bles should be removed to make room for other plantings, such as peanuts, black-eyed peas, late okra, pumpkins, cucumbers, etc. If none of these is desired, plant the vacant spaces to cowpeas and thus be fair to the soil.


