—On Thursday the Police Jury met in special session to open bids for the purchase of the road bonds in the First, Third, Fifth and Eighth Wards amounting to \$185,000. After discussing the proposals received, the members of the Jury rejected the bids in their entirety as being unsatisfactory. From what we were able to ascertain through Police Juror Dietlein it was deemed unwise to sell the bonds which would begin bearing interest immediately upon their disposal when conditions were such that it would very likely be several months yet before the work could be started. The interest on such a large amount of bonds runs into the thousands of dollars annually and it is useless to waste such money until the Jury is assured no difficulty will be experienced in securing gravel and labor. It is the intention of the Jury to push the construction of the highways in the Fourth, Sixth and Seventh Wards as rapidly as possible just as soon as the bonds issued have been given final approval. The road work in the Sixth Ward will be done under the supervision and direction of Engineer W. K. Frantz, while in the Fourth Ward the McCrary Company have been employed as engineers.

—It has begun to dawn upon our citizens that the steps being taken to pave the streets of New Iberia is beginning to bear fruit in more ways than one. Since this improvement has been an assured fact, numerous purchases of real estate has taken place in New Iberia. The last transaction of importance was the sale of the two buildings corner of French and Main Street owned by Mayor Sealy. This property was sold last Wednesday by Mr. R. A. Jacob to the Teche Motor Co. of Jeanerette for \$13,000. The corner floor space will remain as a pool room until the least expires after which the entire structure will be used as a display room for autos and accessories sold by the new purchasers of the property. The other building used as a laundry will be vacated as soon as the proprietors can get another location. In discussing the purchase with Mr. Jackson, a member of the firm, he was very pronounced in his statements that what has held New Iberia back was its public streets and the bad roads leading into the City. Were it not for the improvements soon to be under way in New Iberia these gentlemen would never have considered making such a heavy investment in New Iberia real

estate. To a great many the price of these paving improvements seem extortionate, but when taken into consideration the payments are divided into eleven installments there are but few property holders that will not be in position to meet the payments. The costs will be collected annually when the taxes are paid into the City treasury.

—We had an appreciated call on Thursday from Mr. A. C. Snoko the Mayor of the Village of Loreauville. In discussing contemplated improvements in his town, Mr. Snoko informed us that the citizens this week voted a five mill special tax covering a period of five years to build and equip an electric light plant. It is proposed to install a crude oil engine and render both the day and night service. Loreauville has been making rapid progress for the past ten years and a movement is now on foot to extend the City limits which will add to the population. From what we are told those who reside out of the present limits of the corporation are all anxious to be taken in the municipality, so as to get the benefit of light service and better sidewalks and streets. Mr. Snoko is practically a newcomer in Loreauville having settled there only about two years ago. Last April he was elected Mayor without any opposition which bespeaks much for one who has been identified with the community for such a short period. He is a wide-awake official and we do not doubt but what Loreauville will continue to thrive with him at the head of its government.
