LOCALS

Mr. Thos. LITERARY CURIOSITY.

On Wednesday last we had a pleasant call from Mr. H. McWhenny of San Antonio, Texas. Mr. McWhenny carried with him a small newspaper printed on wall paper in New Iberia in the year 1864. The literary curiosity was neatly printed on six inches of common wall paper. The gentleman stated that it was one of the original copies and had been preserved by his wife's mother, Mrs. Nellie Roberts, who lived here during the civil war. Most of the old inhabitants will recall that Mr. Roberts conducted a large wheelwright business here after the war on the vacant site adjoining the present Frederic Hotel. From here the family removed to Texas. We herewith reproduce the article in full as it appears on the relic:

THE CONFEDERACY EXTRA.

New Iberia, Jan. 17th, 1864.

GLORIOUS NEWS!!! THE CONFEDERACY IS RECOGNIZED.

We have conversed with a Gent. just from the camp below this place, and he states that he had read the New Orleans Bee, and the Times of the 14th inst. in which he found that England and France through their correspondents, will after the 4th of March, 1865 recognize Abraham Lincoln only as President of the Northern States.

Gen. Polignac has been sent to Paris on a mission of the greatest importance, we are certain, as it is by special request of our noble President Jefferson Davis. Several Yankee deserters passed through town this evening.
