The daily rains throughout this Parish is causing heavy losses to the farmers who planted late rice and from what we learn a great percentage of it will be left in the fields unless there is an early cessation of water from the clouds. Even the sugar situation looks very precarious owing to the condition of the fields, and the public roads. In many instances it is impossible for the farmers to haul their cane to the railroad derricks and sugar mills. Never in the history of this country has the rainfall been so heavy as for the past ten months. This shows the urgent need of something being done toward fixing the highways, inasmuch as our Police Jury has been unable to get all of the gravel highway started. It is useless for those who own country property to wait until others do for them what they should do for themselves. What is everybody's business is no one business, and the sooner the holders of country estates realize it, the better for their own interests. The very same situation confronts the country resident to-day as last winter with but little hope for relief. Prospects are exceedingly bright for cane to bring \$14.00 per ton at the mill, but the farmers will be very much handicapped traveling over some of the roads of the Parish.
