**LOCAL NEWS.**

—Divine services will be conducted by Rev. Mr. Paradis on Sunday morning at 11 o'clock. The public is cordially invited to be present.

—The civil term of the 19th Judicial District Court was convened into session last Monday by Judge James Simon of St. Martinsville. The docket from what we could ascertain is exceptionally light in this Parish.

—Several carloads of gravel, brick and cement arrived here this week to be used on Main and Railroad Avenue. This is good news for the people of our City who are more than anxious to see this important street work begin as rapidly as possible. From what Mayor Sealy informed us the work will first be commenced starting from the Southern Pacific depot and thence be continued on to the Post Office. Now that the material is beginning to arrive this work should be under full headway in the next ten days at the very latest.

The next big political rally in the State will be held at Alexandria on November 11th, Armistice Day. One of the features of the celebration will be a joint debate between Stubbs and Parker.

—Press reports from Lafayette are to the effect that New Iberia will soon get up a base ball club to join the league of clubs recently formed at our sister town. This will make the eight entering for a pennant fight next year. From what we read Mayor Sealy and Sheriff Landry proffered their services and promised to raise the money necessary to put our base ball club into the league, which is composed of Alexandria, Oakdale, Lake Charles, Orange, Rayne, Lafayette and Opelousas. November will see the finishing touching, says the Lafayette Gazette onto the league's plans for 1920. On December 20th the organization will be perfected.

—The attention of our readers is called to the announcement in another column of Senator E. L. Simmons of Breaux Bridge who is again seeking the franchise of the voters of the 13th Senatorial District, comprising Iberia, St. Martin and Lafayette Parishes. This District is entitled to two candidates, and Mr. Simmons says he would like to be returned as a member. One of the points the gentleman makes when addressing a voter is the fact that he voted against prohibition and woman's suffrage while in the Legislature. To those who think like him, on these two questions, well and good. On the other hand we believe, in a great measure his opposition to prohibition will cause him the loss of many votes in the District. There were several bills that he fathered, some of which no doubt was beneficial to his constituents.

—Last week we mentioned how dangerous the crossing at Segura was to users of the public road between New Iberia and Burke Station, due to the fact that from Segura it was necessary that all automobiles and teams cross the track, thus taking the risk of being killed by passing trains, suggesting that the Spanish Trail road be constructed on the North side between Segura to Burke Station. We are more than pleased to chronicle the news that early this week, Secretary Bassin of the Police Jury, Mr. Lazard Kling and Mr. Chas. Kerr visited the property holders in that vicinity and secured rights-of-way from Mr. L. E. Doremus, Mrs. J. P. Harrison, Mr. L. P. Latina and Mr. Clovis Segura, so as to enable the Police Jury to build the road the entire route on the North side of the railroad track, a distance of about three miles. Once this road is finished, life and limb will be in no further danger because of the dangerous crossing at Segura. As stated several times in these columns, accidents have taken place there that were serious and steps of this kind should have been taken in hand a number of years ago. Oftentimes just a little effort on the part of interested citizens can so easily rectify these dangerous crossings, if only some interested persons only exert themselves.
