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**SCHOOL AND ROAD TAXES.**

One of the greatest hindrances to education in this section is the opposition of the taxpayer who has no children of his own to educate, or whose children have already received the benefits that the public school system has to offer. In a talk with an Abbeville man, and one well posted on this question, we have been informed that many a district is today unfortunate enough to have large land owners with no interest in education, who are making impossible and improvements by their refusal to co-operate in anything from which they are not to receive a direct benefit.  
The old question of "why should I pay for the education of my neighbors children?" has been the bone of contention throughout the entire fight against illiteracy in this country. And the same argument is offered whenever a road tax is mentioned. Perhaps the man whose farm does not border on a public highway feels he should not pay taxes on the improved road. And yet if the highway is not improved what good to home is the lane running off of it to his own farm? The lane can't take him off of his own property. Those living on the side roads must awaken to the fact that main traveled roads are of benefit to them, even if they do not reside directly upon them, and they must cooperate if we ever expect to get out of the mud in this section, and stay out of it.

Not only that, but the home merchant helps to keep up the streets and sidewalks, helps to support the school and churches and its digging into his pocket every time charity makes a call. On the other hand the Chicago mail-order men take your money; make a big profit or they could not declare dividends of 20 per cent—and you never reap one penny in benefits.—Progress.

**License Ordinance.**

The following license ordinance and budget were read and adopted as follows:

An ordinance by the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia, La., to levy, collect and enforce payment of an annual license tax upon all persons or persons, business firms or corporations pursuing any trade, vocation, calling or business within the limits of the Parish of Iberia, State of Louisiana, and without the Corporate limits of the City of New Iberia, the Town of Jeanerette, the Villages of Loreauville and Delcambre.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia, La., that there is hereby levied an annual license tax for the year 1920 upon each person or persons, association of persons, business firm or corporations pursuing any trade, vocation, calling or business subject to license within the limits of the Parish of Iberia, La., and without the Corporate limits of the City of New Iberia, the Town of Jeanerette, the Villages of Loreauville and Delcambre.

Sec. 2. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Iberia, La., that on the day following the 4th publication of this ordinance the Tax Collector of the Parish of Iberia shall begin to collect and shall collect as fast as possible from each of those enumerated below a license tax as herein graduated.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that all licenses shall be due and collected during the first two months of the year 1920 and all unpaid licenses shall become delinquent on the first day of March, 1920 and all firms who commence business after this date shall pay their licenses within ten days following the opening of their business.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc., that for any person or persons operating a public dance hall, ball room or any other place of amusement where an entrance fee is charged, either directly or indirectly, or where refreshments are sold, shall pay an annual license of Ten Dollars, (\$10.00).

Sec. 5. And that for any circus or traveling show of any kind the annual license shall be:

- (a) When employing 100 persons or more, One Hundred Dollars, (\$100.00.)
- (b) When employing less than 100 persons the license shall be Fifty Dollars, (\$50.00.)
- Sec. 6. And that for the conduct of any retail mercantile business by any one either as principal or agent, the annual license shall be:
  - (a) When the annual gross sales are \$25,000 or more, Twenty Five Dollars, (\$25.00.)
  - (b) When the annual gross sales are \$20,000 or less than \$25,000, the license shall be Twenty Dollars, (\$20.00.)
  - (c) When the annual gross sales are \$15,000 or less than \$20,000 the license shall be Fifteen Dollars, (\$15.00.)
  - (d) When the annual gross sales are \$5,000.00 or less than \$15,000 the license shall be Ten Dollars, (\$10.00), and when the annual gross sales are \$5000.00 or less the license shall be Five Dollars, (\$5.00.)
- Sec. 7. Be it further ordained, etc., that each peddler or hawkler shall pay an annual license for the year 1920 as follows:
  - (a) When traveling on any boat or water craft the license shall be Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars, (\$250.00.)
  - (b) When traveling in a automobile or any other self-propelling vehicle the license shall be Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars, (\$250.00.)
  - (c) When traveling in a two-horse vehicle the license shall be One Hundred Dollars, (\$100.00.)
  - (d) When traveling in a one-horse vehicle the license shall be Seventy Five Dollars, (\$75.00.)
  - (e) When traveling on horse back the license shall be Sixty Dollars, (\$60.00.)
- (f) When traveling on foot the license shall be Fifty Dollars, (\$50.00.)
- Sec. 8. Be it further ordained, etc., that for every automobile, auto truck, motor cycle or any other self-propelling vehicle kept within the Parish of Iberia and without the Corporate limits of the City of New Iberia, The Town of Jeanerette the Villages of Loreauville and Delcambre an annual license is hereby levied as follows:
  - (a) When with a seating capacity of seven or more, Seven Dollars, (\$7.00.)
  - (b) When with a seating capacity of five or less than seven, Five Dollars, (\$5.00.)
  - (c) When the seating capacity is two or less than five, Three Dollars, (\$3.00.)
  - (d) For motor truck or freight carrying automobile, Five Dollars, (\$5.00.)
  - (e) For motor cycle, Two Dollars, (\$2.00.)
- Sec. 9. Be it further ordained, etc., that the following trades are subject to an annual license of Five Dollars to-wit:
  - Doctors and transcient photographers.
