### INTERCHURCH MOVEMENT.

In our issue of Thursday we printed a criticism by Rev. H. W. Rickey, pastor of the First Methodist church, relating to the inter-church world movement to raise \$1,350,000,000, and it struck us as being a very timely statement. In the first place, drives seem to have become epidemic without rhyme or reason beyond the necessity for maintaining jobs for publicity bureaus, and the versatility of the resourceful propagandist in these modern days is one of the marvels of the century. Any sort of a pretext is sufficient to start a dazzling and bewildering maze of arguments and "appeals" for money and the public has become so accustomed to the unceasing request to dig down and dig up that the motion of complying has become almost mechanical with said public. The average businessman hesitates and inwardly rebels at these constant appeals, but the propagandist has a way of insinuating that non-compliance will mean ostracism by his clan, church or society, and thus the victim is bulldozed or blackmailed into donating. Jesse James had a far different, but none the less effective system. Insofar as relates to the interchurch movement there are some things about it that seem to demand an explanation as a sort of preface to the movement itself, since such an explanation has not been vouchsafed voluntarily, and that is an explanation of the scope and scheme of the movement. What's it all about? Why so much money? What is going to be done with this great sum after it is wrung from the public purse? Practically all the churches in the country, with the exception of the Catholic church, have staged their individual drives for stated causes, and made a success of them in each instance because they appealed to their own people. This interchurch movement is something that the public has not yet understood and about the only explanation given for it so far has been that somebody or something needs \$1,350,000,000 for some purpose not made clear and is going through the motion of dragging it out of the already drive-sickened people. In all drives for worthy causes or the promotion of war funds or local enterprises, the Gazette has co-operated to the full, but it has seemed to us that the Drive Age became obsolete with the end of the war and that the people had pungled up with such generosity and such un-murmuring zeal in the past as to deserve immunity during this period of reconstruction and readjustment and hard times in battling with constantly soaring prices of necessities and the growing disparity in these prices and the average individual income. We are sending millions for the relief of the Near East, wherever that is, and whoever and whatever it is, and neglecting measures for relieving a hard-pressed people here at home.

There always will be suffering in the world and an excuse for donating to relieve it, and unless we turn some of our attention and charity into home channels there always is going to be suffering here at home. Relief of the Near East may be a worthy enterprise, but it can be no more worthy than movements that we are neglecting at home in behalf of our own suffering people. Some of the millions we are sending to Europe could be more appropriately spent in a Christian effort to provide homes for the feeble-minded, insane, crippled, orphans, aged and infirm and sick and distressed among our own people. Not a single drive has been started for any of these unfortunates among us, every effort so far along charitable lines having been directed towards the relief of Europe. Lafayette needs a community house, adequate quarters for prisoners in our jails, a few charity wards in our hospitals and a public fund of sufficient amount to meet every emergency that misfortune and sickness may visit upon the poor of our community. Lafayette needs more money for the extension of its school system. Lafayette needs playgrounds for the children where they may breathe pure air while at play. Lafayette needs money for the extension of agricultural college work at its local institution. There are other things needed here for the uplift and relief of our own people and for the children who will become the citizen of the near-future. There are many ways in which our people can spend their charity funds to great advantage in the way of relief work and educational promotion here at home. The church is a most valuable asset to any community. Civilization cannot exist without it. But if we are going to do any donating to the church we feel that there is ample excuse for contributing right here at home in helping to provide adequate houses of worship, adequate salaries for the pastors, adequate funds for home mission and home relief work and the extension of our church work among our own people. We will support any such movements and drives, but as we have stated heretofore, at the conclusion of the last Salvation Army drive, we feel that future drives should be carefully scrutinized and the cause and its need unquestionably established before lending aid to it. We feel that our people have been generous to a fault and are deserving of exemption from further calls until some worthy emergency arises wherein it becomes the public duty to contribute. As long as the press of the country permits itself to be cajoled or bulldozed into giving publicity to the professional drive specialists these drives will continue, for "driving" now has become a profession, as well as a habit.—Lafayette Gazette.

### FORMER INDIANA CHIEF JUSTICE ENDS LIFE BY HANGING.

Hammond, Ind., March 16.—Judge H. Gillet, 63 years old, formerly chief justice of the Supreme Court of Indiana, hanged himself in the garret of his home today with a clothes line.

Judge Gillet's wife died a year ago and he had been despondent since, according to friends.

He was appointed judge of the Supreme Court of Indiana, in 1902, and was chief justice from 1903 to 1908. Previously he was circuit judge of Lake county for twelve years and also served as assistant attorney general of Indiana.

Since retiring from the bench, Judge Gillet had engaged in the practice of corporation law in Hammond. He was the author of several books on law.
