RE-ENROLLMENT IN THE NAVAL RESERVE FORCE.

Members of the Naval Reserve Force other than Class 1, who performed active duty during the War and who have been discharged on account of expiration of enrollment (discharge three months prior to expiration of enrollment not permitted) may re-enroll within four months from date of expiration of enrollment, providing such re-enrollment is made prior to the signing of the Treaty of Peace and are then eligible for transfer to the regular Navy, securing all the benefits of such transfer as given in Alnav 196.

ALLIES LET DUTCH PROTECT KAISER. London, March 31.—The Allied Powers have accepted Holland's last note regarding the former German emperor, according to an Amsterdam dispatch to the Daily Mail. The Dutch government on March 31 for the second time refused to deliver the former German emperor to the Allies for trial. This determination was set forth in a note addressed to the British premier, which, however, declared that the Dutch government would take all necessary measures to minimize the liberty of Wilhelm and prevent him from endangering the world's peace. The communication states that precautions to this end would be taken "on the spot." It was assumed this meant a close guard over the former German emperor and a strict censorship would be instituted while Wilhelm occupied his estate at Doorn.
