Mr. Comeaux was a grand son of Mr. Adolph Romero at whose home he succumbed. The funeral was conducted from St. Peter's church in this City on Thursday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.

—We are pleased to announce that Road District No. 7 in charge of Messrs. Lionel Delcambre, Homer Landry, Albert Delcambre, Marcel Derouen and E. A. McFihenny have commenced the construction of the highway leading from Salt Mine railroad branch to the Village of Delcambre beyond Jefferson's Island. Some excellent ditching and grading has already been finished and it is reported the road will be in perfect shape to receive the gravel when it reaches its destination. This Board has purchased a large tractor and ditcher which meets every want of the Board in road construction. This highway is one of great importance to that section of the country and we hope nothing will deter, or interfere with its completion during the next sixty days. This particular stretch of road has been in a deplorable condition for the entire past winter, and aside from the inconvenience and cost in wear and tear to the users of the road there has been times when it was impossible for the residents of that section to reach the Parish seat. No highway should be allowed to get into such shape that the country people cannot come to the Court House to transact business and it is a consolation to know that the country property holders in that vicinity will soon have as good a highway as they could wish for, considering the amount of money to be expended.

—The twenty-ninth annual meeting of the Louisiana League of Homestead and Building and Loan Associations scheduled to be held in Lafayette on April 23d and 24th, is now in session. The following delegates were elected to represent the Iberia Building Association, at said convention: Messrs. Lazard Kling, Max Levy, V. J. Erath, A. H. Trotter, W. J. Bernard, A. Daigre, Henry Gallois and W. G. Weeks. Messrs. A. H. Trotter and W. G. —The Circuit Court held a session here last Monday with Judges Mouton, Ellis and Leche sitting on the bench. Eight cases of importance were presented to His Honors for decision, five of which was from litigants of this Parish; two from Vermilion and one from St. Martin. The attorneys before the Court were Hacker, Vuillemot, James D. Simon, of St. Martinsville; J. E. Kibbe and E. R. Kitchell of Abbeville. Among the cases presented were: State ex rei Paul Fournet, Treasurer, versus the town of St. Martinsville; Moore Bros. vs. Telesphore and Olin Thibodeaux, A. J. Goddard, intervenor. A. Gonsoulin vs. Stephen Sparrow; J. E. Broussard vs. Dupre Dugas; Raphael Broussard vs. Lawrence Jones et als Robert J. Boudreaux vs. State National Bank, P. A. Landry et als intervenors. Delcambre, LeBlanc & Co., vs. Isaac Owens et als. The case of Boudreaux vs. State National Bank in which Sheriff Landry is the intervenor is the one a number of our farmers are vitally interested. It dates back to an agreement made by the plaintiff agreeing to build a canning factory in this Parish providing a number of the farmers make purchases of fig trees. It seems a deposit of money was placed in the keeping of the bank to show good faith. In the meantime about eighty per cent of the fig trees sold in this Parish failed to grow and now Mr. Boudreaux is demanding that the State Bank release the money.

SIX MEN INJURED BY OVERTURNING OF RAILS.

Last Monday about 10:30 A. M. three Mexicans and three negro laborers on the Abbeville branch were injured near Erath by the overturning of a flat car loaded with heavy steel rails. The men were all at work along side of the track when the car gave away and turned completely over pinning some of the men under the heavy iron weight. Some suffered broken limbs while others were said to be injured internally. The first aid was rendered to them by Dr. Kibbe of Erath who accompanied them to New Iberia on the Iberia & Vermilion Railroad. At this station they were given surgical attention by Drs. Carstens and Sanders and put aboard the west-bound train and taken to a hospital at Lafayette. Dr. Carstens accompanied the unfortunate victims to the hospital.

JOHN A. FRENCH.

The unexpected death last Thursday night of Capt. John A. French was a shock to his large circle of relatives and friends in this community. Just at what hour he breathed his last, is not known. On Friday morning when his daughter, Mrs. Ralph Landry attempted to awaken him, not receiving a reply, she went to his bed and discovered his life was extinct. Capt. French was born in St. Martin Parish on May 31st, 1848, and reared two sons and two daughters, who survive him. Reaching manhood he took up the vocation of steamboatman and soon won a place with the Southern Pacific Steamship lines as master of one of their boats plying between Morgan City and St. Martinsville. He was engaged in the steamboat business for more than thirty years. Some years ago he resigned his position and conducted a small mercantile store. Later on his health became so impaired that he followed other pursuits and at the time of his death was employed by the City to superintend the City bridge. He was a life-long member of the Knights of Pythias Order of New Iberia. The children are Messrs. Albert and Cleve French and Mrs. Ralph Landry and Mrs. L. J. Hargis of Galveston, Texas. The funeral will be held from St. Peter's church to-day.
